OLOLASURAI CONSERVANCY MANAGEMENT PLAN, 2025-2030

IN EXERCISE of the powers conferred by section 44 (3) of the Wildlife Conservation and Management Act, 2013, the Cabinet Secretary for Tourism and Wildlife gazettes the Plan in the Schedule hereto:

SCHEDULE

Oloasurui Conservancy Management Plan 2025–2030 (hereinafter referred to as “the Plan”) defines the goals, objectives, and actions that Oloasurui Conservancy (hereinafter referred to as “the Conservancy”) has designed to address wildlife conservation, tourism development, community engagement, security, operations and administrative issues in the conservancy.

The Conservancy’s vision, zonation scheme, management programs and plan implementation strategy are presented in the following sections.

Vision

1. To be in a world where wildlife is free and without threats, where wild places are safe and healthy and where people practice conservation to contribute into the ecosystem.

Land Uses and Zones

2. The Conservancy’s zoning is based on current and expected land uses within the conservancy. It facilitates protection of critical habitats and sustainable use of the area for wildlife conservation and management and other designated activities. The primary land uses in the Conservancy include wildlife and habitat conservation, tourism development and community livelihood activities. To achieve the Conservancy management objectives, four zones have been developed.

Management Programs

3. The Plan comprises four management programs that address the key issues affecting the Conservancy. These programs are summarised in the following sections.

Wildlife Conservation and Management Program

3.1 The purpose of the Wildlife Conservation and Management Program is to ensure the long-term preservation and health of the diverse ecosystems and wildlife within Oloasurui Conservancy. The program aims to achieve this purpose through implementation of management objectives that focus on: protecting and restoring natural habitats, enhancing biodiversity conservation, mitigating human-wildlife conflict, promoting sustainable land use practices, strengthening community involvement and maximizing conservation benefits, supporting research and data-driven conservation, and creating awareness and advocacy for conservation.

Sustainable Tourism Development and Management Program

3.2 The goal of the Sustainable Tourism Development and Management Program is to provide an exceptional and responsible tourism experience that aligns with the conservancy’s core values of low-impact development, biodiversity conservation, and community empowerment. This will be accomplished through the implementation of management objectives that focus on: promoting low-impact tourism, enhancing visitor experience, maximizing conservation benefits from tourism, supporting local community development, promoting eco-friendly infrastructure and practices, and diversifying tourism products.

Grazing Plan and Management Program

3.3 The Grazing Plan and Management Program endeavours to promote the sustainable management of grazing resources within the Oloasurui Conservancy by balancing the needs of local communities and wildlife, fostering biodiversity conservation, and restoring land health through holistic grazing practices. The program seeks to achieve this purpose through the implementation of a series of objectives that prioritize regulating grazing pressure, improving land health, supporting livelihoods, integrating local knowledge with scientific grazing management techniques, and introducing and promoting sustainable livestock breeds.

Operations, Administration and Security Program

3.4 The overall goal of this program is to establish a robust and efficient operational, administrative, and security framework that ensures the smooth running of the Oloasurui Conservancy, promotes effective resource management, safeguards biodiversity, and guarantees the safety of both visitors and the local community. The program focuses on enhancing efficient

conservancy operations, strengthening administrative framework, promoting robust security and law enforcement, and encouraging community involvement in governance.

Plan Implementation, Monitoring and Evaluation

4. A 5-year implementation plan has been developed to prioritize and address the most urgent and impactful tasks within the duration of the management plan. Monitoring and Evaluation will serve as a critical tool for the Conservancy management and the Board to track progress and assess the effectiveness of the plan’s goals. The Oloasurui Conservancy Board and Enkopiro Directors will prepare and submit a compliance report to KWS at the end of the second and fourth years of plan implementation. Additionally, an internal monitoring and evaluation system will be established to provide continuous oversight and support ongoing assessment.

EVALUATION REPORT PREPARED PURSUANT TO ARTICLE 234(2) (H) OF
THE CONSTITUTION FOR 2023/2024 FINANCIAL YEAR

Executive Summary

The 2023/2024 report was prepared pursuant to the Commission's mandate of promoting, evaluating and reporting on the levels of compliance with the values and principles in Articles 10 and 232 of the Constitution in the public service.

An online tool was used to collect data from 585 targeted institutions across six service sectors. The exercise was undertaken in two phases - phase one involved the collection of data on staff bio-data and phase two involved collection of data against eight thematic areas. The data was collected from 536 institutions in phase one on organizational structure, staff establishment, and personnel practices in the institutions. 49 institutions were non-responsive.

Phase two targeted 536 institutions which responded in phase one out of which 508 responded. 28 institutions were non-responsive. The survey had a response rate of 91.6% in Phase 1 and 86.8% in Phase 2. Data was sought from 41 oversight institutions to facilitate triangulation of information from MDAs and 30 of the 41 institutions submitted the data, and 11 were non-responsive.

The Commission took stock of the implementation status of recommendations in the values and principles compliance reports submitted to the President and Parliament over the 12 years period. The overall implementation status of the recommendations from the reports revealed that out of the 470 recommendations generated, only 66 (14%) were fully implemented, 70 (14.9%) were partially implemented, 140 (29.8%) were ongoing, while 194 (41.3%) were not implemented.

The findings show that ongoing and partially implemented recommendations accounted for 44.7% of the total recommendations, suggesting that while there was some progress in the implementation

of the recommendations, most of the recommendations had not been implemented leading to a slow pace in the realization of desired societal and public service transformations. These slow and low pace of implementation of recommendations hinder progress in the promotion of the values and principles and pose challenges in the translation of recommendations into actionable policies to address gaps in good governance and operational efficacy within the public service. These findings therefore highlight the urgent need for renewed focus and strategic action to ensure that the recommendations are implemented for the realisation of societal transformation.

The Commission undertook an impact evaluation on the implementation of values and principles from 2011 to 2023. One of the parameters used to assess the implementation of the values and principles was the level of awareness of the values and principles by the citizens. The survey revealed that over half of the respondents (1,392, 55.6%) were not aware of the values and principles, with the youth being the majority at (840, 56.7%). The evaluation also revealed that awareness levels improved at higher age brackets and levels of education. The National Government needs to undertake more awareness campaigns through civic education for the citizens. The awareness intervention for the youth should include the use of age-appropriate media in civic education, such as social media, music and drama festivals and sporting activities.

The Framework for Implementation of Values and Principles provides guidelines on how public institutions should promote and mainstream the values and principles in their business processes. Public institutions reported having undertaken various activities to promote the national and public service values and principles. The promotional activities included training and sensitization, civic education, dissemination of IEC materials, radio and TV talk shows, use of print and social media, conferment of excellence award schemes, development of artworks, use of performing arts, sporting activities and sponsorship of activities on values and principles

The findings on the training and sensitization on values and principles revealed that most (368, 72.4%) of the evaluated institutions did not train officers on values and principles, and even for those who trained or sensitized, very few (26,272, 12.1%) public officers were trained. Public institutions should undertake more training and sensitization on values and principles to promote compliance.

Section 11 of the Public Service Values and Principles Act, 2015 require public service to facilitate public participation in the promotion of values and principles of public service through citizens fora, village councils, faith-based organizations, Boards of management of learning institutions, welfare and resident associations, market user's committees, self-help groups and other registered and unregistered groups organized at sub-county level. The evaluation revealed that most (412, 81.1%) institutions did not undertake civic education. The number of participants who benefited from civic education was marginal at 69,417 (0.24%) against the eligible population of 29,228,116 (2019 census) of persons aged 15 years and above. It is recommended that public institutions undertake at least two civic education sensitization programmes annually in the context of how the values and principles apply to their work and citizens' role in ensuring adherence to the Values and Principles.

Some strategies recommended for the promotion of values and principles include development of IEC materials for dissemination, media talk shows, social media engagement, print media, artwork, sporting activities and performing arts. Most institutions did not utilise these strategies to promote values and principles. Television and radio were the most popular platforms used for talk shows. At the same time, newspapers, Facebook, followed by X space, Instagram, and email were the most utilized print and social media platforms to promote values and principles. It is recommended that all public institutions implement the promotional strategies recommended in the Framework for Implementation of Values and Principles, 2015.

The other strategies recommended for promoting values and principles include conferment of honours and awards to best-performing value carriers and drivers. Most institutions evaluated did not confer honours and awards on exemplars who implemented, adhered to, or promoted values and principles. A low-level celebration and recognition of those who practice and exemplified the values and principles undermine efforts to promote the values and principles. It is recommended that the National Honours and Awards Committee introduce a category of awards for those who best exemplify the Values and Principles by upholding, modelling and practicing. It is also recommended that all public institutions institutionalize

excellence awards through recognition and commendation of exemplary value drivers and value carriers.

Another suitable forum for the promotion of values and principles is participation in Public Service Week, where citizens and public officers interact, share service delivery experiences and challenges, and agree on solutions for service delivery improvements. Half of the evaluated public institutions (261, 51.4%) reported participating in Public Service Week. It was recommended that all public institutions organize and /or participate in Public Service Week at least once annually to provide an avenue for interaction and receipt of citizen feedback on service delivery, including the implementation of values and principles.

The values and principles evaluated for compliance included the values and principles of efficiency and effectiveness of the public service, sustainable development and representation of diverse Kenyan communities. An efficient public service is predicated on optimal staffing informed by the existence of organizational mandate, workload analysis, organization structure and an organizational strategic plan. Optimal staffing also supports wage bill sustainability and the ability of an institution to function efficiently and effectively. The evaluation revealed that most 60 (88%) institutions that established new offices had not undertaken workload analysis in the last three years. This was in breach of Section 27 of the Public Service Commission Act, 2017, which requires that a workload analysis be undertaken before establishing offices. Most institutions were not optimally established; some were over-established by more than half, while others, 38 (11%), had a high percentage (70%) of under-establishment. There were also unexplained variances between staff reported in the staff register and the in-post. One service sector of TVETIs was not evaluated on staff establishment because institutions did not have authorized establishments.

It is recommended that all public institutions comply with the statutory requirement to undertake workload analysis before approval of organizational structure and authorised establishment. The institutions must reconcile their staff registers with their staff in post to ensure consistency in staff numbers. They must also bridge the over- and under-establishment gaps by reviewing their establishments to ensure optimal staffing.

The previous evaluation reports have consistently reported the existence of staff in the public service who serve on permanent terms without pension. The 2023/24 evaluation report had 2,106 (0.9%) officers reported to be serving on permanent terms without pension. While the government has established a public service superannuation scheme for public officers, officers serving on permanent but non-pensionable terms should be translated to permanent and pensionable. Another personnel practice prevalent in the service is the engagement of staff on temporary terms without any legal or policy provision for such a term of service. The 2023/24 evaluation report had 9,371 (4%) officers reported to be serving on temporary terms. It is recommended that public institutions with staff serving on temporary terms translate the terms into either contract or permanent and pensionable. Some institutions also reported 15,127 (6.5%) staff serving on a casual basis contrary to court judgement by the Employment and Labour Relations Court outlawing casual service engagement and proffering alternative modes of lawful engagement for the same purpose. It is recommended that public institutions that engaged casual employees comply with the court judgement. (*Petition No. 2 of 2013 Peter Wambugu Kariuki and 16 others Vs Kenya Agricultural Research Institute*).

The age composition of staff in the public service was normal, with the youth proportionately represented relative to their national population size. The majority 141, 628 (61.1%) of officers in the public service were under the median age of 46 years. It is, however, recommended that all public institutions develop and implement human resource management and development plans with comprehensive succession management projections to mitigate against under-establishments and ensure the sustainability of the normal public service age distribution curve.

On salary payment, it was reported that the highest number of staff who had suffered delay in payment of salaries were from public universities. Public institutions to operate within the prescribed 35% wage bill to revenue ratio, implement the recommended 70:30 ratio of staff in technical to support functions and migrate their payment systems to the IHRS system.

The Commission issued a circular to the service dated 8th August 2023 (Ref. PSC/GEN/22/11/91) guiding the ratio of staff in technical

to support functions in public institutions to be 70:30. The evaluation revealed that most 335 (66%) of the institutions had not complied with the prescribed ratio. It was recommended that all public institutions comply with the prescribed ratio by 30th June 2026.

The Bottom-Up Economic Transformation Agenda (BETA) policy is part of the manifesto of the Kenya Kwanza administration and is being implemented through the fourth Medium Term Plan (MTP IV) for 2023-2027. One of the pillars is the establishment of a digital superhighway and creative industry. The Government required public institutions to establish and operationalize digitalization committees as one of the strategies for implementing the digital superhighways and the creative industry strategy. The evaluation established that 283 (55.7%) of the evaluated institutions had established digitalization committees. However, less than half (42.9%) of the established committees were operational. It was also a requirement that institutions undertake baseline surveys to determine internal levels of digitalization. The evaluation established that only one-third 174 (34.3%) of the institutions with committees had undertaken baseline surveys to determine internal levels of digitalization. Public institutions were also required to document, automate and migrate their business processes to e-delivery platforms. Most (393, 77%) of the evaluated institutions reported to have documented and automated their business processes. Although, 258 (51%) institutions reported to have migrated their business processes to e-platform 1,134 (34.1%) services reported to have been migrated to e-platforms were not available on the platforms.

To promote ease of access to public services and accelerate the uptake of e-processes by Public Institutions, it is recommended that the State Department responsible for ICT undertake an audit of the status of automation of services and migration to e-platforms and all public institutions to document, automate and migrate their business processes to e-platforms by 30th June, 2025. To achieve this, all public institutions should establish and operationalize digitalization committees, while institutions that had not undertaken baseline surveys to determine their levels of digitalization to undertake the surveys by 30th June, 2025.

Social media has increasingly become an important means of communication in the public service. Most public institutions and public officers use social media platforms for official communications. The platforms include Facebook, YouTube, Instagram, WhatsApp, X (formerly Twitter), podcasts and Blogs. The increased use of social media platforms without regulations or policy guidelines poses a problem in information management and data protection in the public service. The evaluation established that most (402, 79.1%) of the institutions had not developed social media engagement guidelines. It is therefore recommended that the state department responsible for communication and broadcasting develop social media engagement guidelines for public officers by 30th June 2025.

Article 232 (1) (c) of the constitution on values and principles of public service requires public institutions and officers to render services in a responsive, prompt, effective, impartial and equitable manner. Section 7 of the Public Service Values and Principles Act 2015 provides that public service is not prompt where there is an unreasonable delay in delivery of the service as provided for in the institution's service charter. It was established that 251 (49.4%) of the institutions evaluated had customer service registers, and 315 (62%) received complaints about service delivery. Most of the complaints were related to delays in service delivery and unsatisfactory services; over half (52.2%) of the complaints had not been resolved. The customer service registers also allow service seekers to compliment the institution or service providers. Most (61.0%) of the institutions evaluated did not report receiving client compliments.

It was recommended that all public institutions operationalize client service registers, comply with the requirement to resolve complaints within 90 days of the complaints being raised, and review and implement citizen service delivery charters in conformity with the recommendations made by the Commission by 30th June, 2025.

Huduma Centres were introduced in the Kenyan public service in November, 2013 as a one-stop service delivery platform. This was to enable Kenyans to access services without the hassle of moving from one office to another, which was time-consuming, expensive, inefficient, and ineffective. This was also meant to reduce bureaucracy and red tape, which gave rise to rent-seeking opportunities. The citizen satisfaction survey undertaken in the FY2023/24 revealed that most citizens sought services from Huduma centres and the Huduma mode of service delivery was a more efficient and effective service delivery model. The evaluation established that most (92.9%) of the institutions

evaluated did not offer services under the Huduma platform. A total of 150 services are offered in the Huduma Centres. It is however not possible to estimate the percentage of services offered in the absence of an inventory of government services. It is recommended that national government take stock of services offered by public institutions, introduce Huduma in every sub-county, establish Huduma mobile caravans for the nomadic population of northern Kenya, review and modernize back-end processes, review business processes and introduce end to end systems integrating front office and back-end services under one roof.

Article 11(2) (b) and (c) requires the state to recognize the role of science and indigenous technologies in the development of the nation and promote the intellectual property rights of the people of Kenya. Economic development is largely knowledge-driven and requires investment in education, research and innovations. A knowledge-driven economy supports the principle of sustainable development. One way of establishing an economy's readiness for industrial and technological take-off is the number of patents registered in various fields. It was established that most (443, 87.2%) of the institutions evaluated did not register any patents, and most (91.1%) of the patents registered were industrial-related patents owned by individuals. It is recommended that the State Department for Industry and Trade take proactive measures to promote innovations and inventions, leading to increased registration of patents necessary for industrial and economic development.

Copyright is a type of intellectual property that protects the original work of authorship when an author fixes the work in a tangible form of expression. It gives the owners of the works exclusive rights to deal with the works in whatever manner permissible under the law. It was established that very few (20, 3.9%) evaluated institutions had copyrighted products, and most (71%) of the copyrighted works were sound recordings and audio-visual materials. It is recommended that the Kenya Copyright Board undertakes more awareness creation to increase the number of copyrights on creative works and innovations, including by digital content creators.

Section 71 of the Kenya Health Act, 2017 requires employers to provide workplace lactation stations designed to help mothers combine breastfeeding or expressing milk with their work responsibilities. The lactation stations are also meant to serve clients seeking services in public institutions. It was established that most (62.8%) of the evaluated institutions had not set up lactation stations. Therefore, all public institutions should set up lactation stations by 30th June, 2025 in compliance with Section 71 of the Health Act 2017.

The overall performance index for the thematic area of improvement in service delivery was 53.6%. Few institutions (97, 19.0%) were rated as high achievers at 87.3%, while most of the institutions (321, 63.2) were rated as medium achievers at 54.6%, and (90 17.7%) were rated as low achievers at 13.8%.

Article 232 (1) (a) of the Constitution requires public officers to uphold high standards of professional ethics. The standards for professionalism and ethics are prescribed in various legislations and codes of conduct, including the Public Officer Ethics Act, 2003 and the Leadership and Integrity Act, 2012. Section 5 (3) of the Public Service Values and Principles Act, 2015 requires an officer who is a member of a regulated professional body to observe that body's ethical and professional requirements, including registration, licensing, continuous professional development and adherence to the body's code of practice.

The evaluation sought to establish the status of high standards of professional ethics in the public service in terms of registration, licensing, good standing and commitment to the code. It was established that most (84.5%) of the professionals serving in the evaluated institutions were registered with their professional bodies although over half (56%) did not have current practising licenses. It was also noted that more than half (53.4%) of the members of the professional bodies in the public service did not undergo continuous professional development training, most of whom (6,077 86.5%) were drawn from the health sector. It was also noted that most (77.6%) of the professionals in evaluated institutions were in good standing. Only a few members of the professional bodies were charged in court for professional misconduct with more than half (57.1%) of those charged were convicted. The disciplinary status for less than one-third (22.2%) of the professionals could not be ascertained as information was not provided. It was further noted that most (57.5%) of the TVET trainers had not undergone professional training on curriculum delivery (pedagogy).

It is recommended that all public institutions ensure that all eligible professionals serving in the institutions are registered with their professional bodies, undergo continuous professional development and maintain current practicing status to promote high standards of professional ethics. It is also recommended that all public institutions maintain an updated database of the disciplinary status of registered professionals in their institutions and the State Department for Technical and Vocational Training to fast-track professional training of trainers through availing of more training opportunities for trainers by 30th June, 2025.

Section 9 of the Public Service Code of Conduct and Ethics, 2016 requires a public officer to demonstrate professionalism in the performance of duties and to conduct themselves in a way that maintains public confidence in the integrity of the public office. The code also requires officers to treat all persons with courtesy and respect. The code further requires a public officer to improve the standards of performance and professionalism in the institution, observe official working hours, and not be absent without proper authorization or reasonable cause. Public officers are also required to maintain appropriate mode of dress and personal hygiene.

It was established that over half (58.5%) of the institutions sensitized staff on the public service code of conduct and ethics, and less than one-third (20.3%) of the officers had signed the commitment to the code. It is recommended that all public institutions undertake staff sensitization and require staff to commit to the Public Service Code of Conduct and Ethics, 2016 by 30th June, 2025.

The Commission vide circular Ref. No. PSC.3/1/IV/32/25 dated 27th June, 2022 and Ref. No. PSC/ADM/13(42) dated 22nd May 2023 required institutions to authenticate academic and professional certificates used by officers to secure appointments and promotions. Institutions were directed to terminate the services of any officer found to have used fake certificates to secure appointments or promotions and forward the names to the investigative agencies. The evaluation sought to establish the status of authentication of academic and professional certificates and the action taken against officers found with fake certificates. It was established that some officers were found to have fake academic certificates (0.5%) and professional certificates (0.1%) even though the status of authentication of certificates for 143,249 of the officers was not provided. It was also noted that action was taken against most (84.9%) academic and (95.4%) professional of the officers found with fake certificates.

It is recommended that all public institutions complete the authentication of certificates of all their staff by 30th June, 2025 and institutionalize authentication of certificates of officers before issuance of appointment letters at entry level and those being considered for promotional appointments.

The overall performance index for the thematic area of high standards of professional ethics in public service was 56.7%. Few institutions (80, 15.7%) were rated as high achievers with a mean score of 86.3% while most of the institutions (338, 66.5%) were rated as medium achievers with a mean score of 59.2%, and 90 (17.7%) were rated as low achievers with a mean score of 21.4%.

Article 10 (2) (c) and 232 (1) of the Constitution provide for values and principles of good governance. Good governance is the accountable exercise of power and authority. This includes prudent utilization of public resources by those entrusted with managing them. The evaluation sought to establish compliance with good governance practices in the public service.

Constitutional and Statutory Commissions, State Corporations, Semi-Autonomous Government Agencies, Public Universities and TVETIs are run by commissions, boards or councils responsible for policy and oversight management of the institution. These bodies are considered functional when they have quorum to transact board business. Boards/Councils are the decision-making bodies and are part of the good governance structures for the efficient and effective management of the institutions. The evaluation sought to establish functionality of Commissions, Boards and Councils. It was established that most (412, 90.3%) of the evaluated institutions had commissions, boards or councils, and 34 (7%) boards and councils had more members than those approved. It was recommended that the appointing authorities responsible for appointment of commissioners and board and council members to ensure that the Commissions/Boards/Councils are fully constituted by 30th June 2025.

The Public Procurement Code of Ethics for procuring entities is prescribed under Section 181 of the Public Procurement and Asset Disposal Act 2015 (Revised 2022) to regulate the ethical conduct of persons participating in procurement processes in a procuring entity. The evaluation sought to establish the number of institutions that had customized the code of ethics for procuring entities issued by the Public Procurement Oversight Authority. It was established that most 467 (91.9%) public institutions had not customized the code of conduct and ethics for persons participating in public procurement while 28 (19.3%) were still using the obsolete code derived from a repealed Act. In addition, 9 (6.2%) were using the Kenya Institute of Supplies Management code which is customized for registered professionals under KISM. It is recommended that all public institutions customize the code of conduct and ethics for persons participating in public procurement by 30th June 2025.

Section 18 of the Data Protection Act, 2019, requires all data handlers to register as data processors and controllers with the Data Protection Commissioner. The evaluation sought to establish the number of institutions registered as data processors and controllers. It was established that most (77.8%) of the evaluated institutions had not registered as data processors and/or controllers. It is recommended that all public institutions that handle data register as data processors and/or controllers by 30th June, 2025.

Corruption by public officers undermines the effectiveness of government policy, economic development and the transparency and accountability of public institutions. High cases of corruption indicate weaknesses in governance structures. The evaluation sought to establish the number of officers reported for corruption, the nature of corruption cases reported, the status of the investigations and court cases and the value of assets/money lost or recovered. It was established that most 480 (94.5%) of the evaluated institutions did not report having recorded cases of corruption. Most 206 (61.1%) of the reported corruption cases were investigated and completed even though conclusion of court cases was low (32, 9.5%). One institution accounted for the highest value of assets lost and one other institution accounted for half of the value of assets recovered. It is recommended that all public institutions establish effective mechanisms for reporting corruption cases and agencies tasked with investigation and prosecution to expedite investigations and prosecution of reported corruption cases.

Article 10 (2) (a) of the Constitution on the national values and principles of governance requires all persons to observe the rule of law. High number of litigations against public institutions is an indication of poor governance. Litigations are minimised where proper governance structures and the rule of law is followed. The evaluation sought to establish the number of civil proceedings against public institutions, the nature of the cases and judgements made. It was established that more than half (295, 58.1%) of the evaluated institutions did not report having any civil proceedings. The number of suits filed against public institutions increased by almost half (1,878) from those filed in 2022/2023, and most (63.0%) of the judgements delivered on the suits filed were declaratory (a court order that does not require any action or award of damages). It was also noted that awards totalling KSh. 43.8B were made against public institutions compared to KSh. 3.8B made in favour of public institutions. The civil suits filed against public institutions had increased from 262 in 2021/2022 to 6,063 in 2023/2024 an increase of 5,801 (2,214%). Similarly, the awards against the government increased from KSh. 12,611,008,586 in 2021/2022 to KSh. 43,851,220,746 in 2023/2024 an increase of KSh. 31,240,212,160 (247.7%).

It is recommended that the office of the Attorney-General compile an inventory of all suits filed against public institutions in the last three years, establish the awards against public institutions, determine the reasons for the loss of cases and the escalating awards against the government. It is also recommended that the office of the Attorney-General undertake reforms in the management of civil litigations and develop a risk mitigation framework to insulate Government against the rising cost of awards through court judgements. It is further recommended that public officers who occasioned the litigation through acts of omission or commission be held personally liable for any awards that may arise from the litigation.

Gifts are regulated in public service because of perceptions that they may be conduits for bribes or may be a means of exerting undue influence on public officials. Public officers may receive gifts while on official duty subject to the exemptions provided under the regulations on gifts. Public institutions are required to maintain gift registers in a

prescribed format containing records of the name of the officer, nature, value and purpose of gifts received, the date an officer received the gift, and the decision made by management on the disposal of the gift. Some gifts such as in the nature of cash, precious stones and ornaments or artifacts derived from endangered flora or fauna prohibited under international Convention and Protection of Endangered Species are prohibited from being given or received as gifts. The evaluation sought to establish the number of public officers who received, declared and recorded the gift and the decision made on the disposal of the gift. It was established that most 435 (85.6%) of the institutions did not report their employees having received any gifts. It was noted that most 383 (39.2%) of the gifts given to public officers were branded promotional materials. 87 officers, mostly from regulatory agencies, received prohibited gifts like cash and alcoholic drinks. It is recommended that all public institutions that did not have gift registers introduce them by 30th June, 2025, as well as public institutions where officers were reported to have received prohibited gifts to sanction the officers.

An institution may give out gifts as a dictate of customs or protocols. The evaluation sought to establish the number of institutions and the number of gifts given out by institutions. It was established that most 439 (86.4%) of the institutions evaluated did not give out gifts, while some (19, 3.7%) institutions gave out gifts valued over KSh. 20,000. It is recommended that the value of gifts given out by public institutions should be regulated to token gifts of low value comprising branded corporate items only, except for gifts which are dictates of state or diplomatic protocols.

Article 75 of the Constitution guides public officers in managing conflicts of interest whenever they occur. A conflict of interest arises when a public officer's personal interests conflict with the officer's public duty. The interests may be pecuniary or non-pecuniary in nature. A public official is required to behave, whether in public or private, in a manner that avoids conflict between personal interests and public or official duties and avoids compromising any public or official matter in favour of a personal interest.

Personal interest is defined to include the self-interests, interests of the spouse or child, and business associates or agents. These include the registrable interests under sections 16 (12) and (14) as prescribed in the Second Schedule of the Leadership and Integrity Act 2012. Conflict of interest also includes circumstances that present under gainful employment under section 26 (2) of LIA. The declaration and record of conflict of interest is one of the mechanisms for promoting the values and principles of good governance, transparency, accountability and integrity mentioned in Article 10 (2) (c) of the Constitution.

The evaluation sought to establish the number of institutions where conflicts of interest were reported, the number of institutions which maintained the conflict-of-interest registers, and those that had administered the Schedule of Registrable Interests. It was established that most 474 (93.3%) institutions did not report conflict-of-interest cases. Most 489 (96.3%) institutions did not administer the schedule of registrable interests for their staff. No audit had been undertaken on the implementation of the schedule of registrable interests since the enactment of LIA in 2012.

It is recommended that all public institutions implement management of conflict of interest strategies as prescribed in the Leadership and Integrity Act, the Public Officer Ethics Act, Regulations and Public Service Code of Conduct and Ethics 2016 by 30th June 2025. It is also recommended that EACC undertakes an audit on the implementation and compliance with the integrity laws since 2010 to establish levels of compliance. It is also recommended that Parliament fast-track the passage of the Conflict of Interest Bill, 2023 as originally drafted with the provisions on establishment of blind trusts and divestiture of interests.

Article 10 (2) (c) of the Constitution on national values and principles of governance provides for the values and principles of Good Governance, transparency and accountability. Kenya signed and ratified the United Nations Convention Against Corruption on 3rd December, 2003. Article 8 of the Convention requires state parties to the treaty to make requirements for their public officials to subscribe to a public service code of conduct and ethics and file financial disclosures of themselves, their spouse/s and dependent children under the age of 18 years. This was given effect through the enactment of the Public Officer Ethics Act, 2003. Part IV of the Act requires public officers to declare their income, assets and liabilities, and those of their spouse/s and dependent children under 18 years within thirty (30) days

of joining service, every two years as scheduled and within thirty (30) days of exiting service. This is a mechanism for management of conflict of interest and the promotion of ethics and integrity in public service.

The Commission is a responsible Commission for declaration of officers in Ministries and State Departments, State Corporations and SAGAs and Statutory Commissions and Authorities. The evaluation sought to establish the status of compliance with the requirement for filing initial, every two-year and final declarations of income assets and liabilities by public officers in public institutions. It was established that most 408 (76.1%) of the evaluated institutions made new appointments in 2023/2024, and more than half 4,734 (54.1%) of the newly appointed officers complied with the requirement to file Initial Declaration of Assets and Liabilities. Most 282 (95.9%) of the institutions submitted their every two-year declaration returns to the Commission within the statutory timeline. Most 218,796 (98.7%) of the officers in the targeted institutions complied with the requirement to file financial returns within the statutory timeline. It was also noted less than half 2,510 (29.8%) of the officers who exited service in 2023/2024 complied with the requirement to file final declaration of income, assets and liabilities.

It is recommended that public institutions administer initial declarations as part of the entry requirements for officers joining service within 30 days of joining service and final declarations within 30 days of exiting service. It is also recommended that the Ethics and Anti-Corruption Commission clarify to the service the number and particulars of designated responsible commissions under the Public Officer Ethics Act 2003 by 30th June, 2025.

Article 2(6) of the Constitution states that all treaties and conventions ratified by Kenya form part of the laws of Kenya. Article 132 (1) (iii) of the Constitution obligates the President to submit a report to Parliament on the extent to which Kenya has complied with its international obligations. The evaluation sought to establish the status of implementing ratified treaties and conventions in the public service by the Office of the Attorney-General, as recommended in the 2022/2023 evaluation report. It was established that the Office of the Attorney-General had not audited the implementation of the treaties and conventions ratified by Kenya. It is recommended that the Office of the Attorney-General develops an inventory of treaties and conventions ratified by Kenya and audit the implementation of ratified treaties and conventions by public institutions.

The overall performance index for the thematic area of good governance, transparency and accountability was 39.9%. Few institutions (95, 18.7%) were rated as high achievers at 72% while most of the institutions (333, 65.6%) were rated as medium achievers at 36.1% and (80, 15.7%) were rated as low achievers at 17.4%.

Strategic planning was first introduced in Kenyan public service through implementing the Result-based Management framework in 2004. The framework contained other performance system components such as performance contracting, staff performance appraisals, Rapid Result Initiatives (RRI), client service charters, customer and employee and workplace satisfaction surveys, public service weeks, and the use of frequently asked questions and grievance management manuals. It was established that most 338 (66.5%) of the institutions evaluated had aligned their strategic plans to the 5th generation strategic plan and the Bottom-up Economic Transformation Agenda (BETA). However, less than one-third (94, 27.8%) of the institutions that reviewed or developed their strategic plans submitted them to the State Department for Economic Planning for review, and only a few 25 (29.6%) complied with the State Department for Economic Planning recommendations. It is recommended that all public institutions which had not developed or reviewed and aligned their strategic plans with the BETA Agenda do so and submit the plans to the State Department for Economic Planning for confirmation by 30th June, 2025.

The Commission developed and issued The Public Service (Performance Management) Regulations 2021 for implementation. Section 10 of the regulations requires each institution to establish a performance contracting committee. It was established that 274 (53.9%) of the institutions had constituted performance contracting committees and signed the 2023/2024 FY performance contracts, while more than half 124,370 (57.5%) of the public officers had set performance targets. Less than one-third 134 (32.9%) of the evaluated institutions that implemented the performance contract achieved their set targets.

It is recommended that all public institutions sign performance contracts by 30th August of every financial year, those that had not constituted performance contracting committees to constitute the committee by 30th June, 2025 and all public officers to set their performance targets within fifteen (15) days of signing the performance contract.

Staff performance appraisals are used to evaluate the attainment of planned targets by staff in an institution. It is a measure of efficiency and effectiveness in delivering public services. The staff performance appraisal targets are derived from the targets set in the performance contracts. It was established that more than half 124,370 (57.5%) of the officers in the evaluated institutions set performance targets, and 105,788 (48.9%) of the officers who set performance targets were appraised. One-third 32,519 (30.7%) of the officers appraised attained all their set targets, and only (10,580, 10%) exceeded them. It is recommended that all public institutions implement Regulations 24 and 39 of the Public Service Commission (Performance Management) Regulations, 2021 on setting performance targets and performance appraisals and all officers who were evaluated and rated excellent and very good or underperformed be recognized and rewarded and Placed on Performance Improvement Plan or sanctioned under the Rewards and Sanctions Policy.

All public institutions are required to establish Employee Performance Management Committees (EPMCs), whose main responsibility is to moderate the performance appraisal scores and advise management on appropriate rewards and sanction measures for performance in accordance with the rewards and sanctions policy. It was established that most of the EPMC did not meet to consider and make recommendations on staff performance appraisals and no action was taken on most of the officers appraised. It is recommended that all public institutions to establish functional Employee Performance Management Committees and performance appraisal evaluation ratings and performance contracting evaluation scores be used as the key determinant for promotional appointments and continuity of appointments on contract in the public service in accordance with Regulation 43 (3) (a) of the Performance Contracting Regulations 2021.

The Human Resource Management and Development Plans are meant to guide an organization to identify its current and future human resource needs to achieve its mandate. The Public Service Commission Act, 2017 requires public institutions to establish and abolish offices and appoint persons to hold or act in those offices in accordance with the institution's human resource plans informed by workload analysis. It was established that less than half 198 (36.9%) of the evaluated institutions had developed human resource management and development plans. It is recommended that all public institutions develop human resource management and development plans by 30th June 2025.

Article 232 (1) (g) (h) and (i) on values and principles of the public service provide for fair competition and merit as the basis for appointment and promotion in the public service subject to the representation of Kenya's diverse communities and the affording of adequate and equal opportunities in appointment, training and advancement of men and women, members of all ethnic groups and persons with disabilities. It was established that most 391 (72.9%) of the evaluated institutions made very few 8,447 (3.9%) new appointments. Most 5,480 (62.6%) of the newly appointed officers were not inducted within three months of being appointed, as provided for in the Public Service Induction Manual. It is recommended that all public institutions comply with the requirement to induct all newly appointed officers within three months of appointment per the public service training policy.

Article 234 (2) (f) of the Constitution mandates the Commission to develop human resources in the public service. The public service training policy guides human resources development in the Public Service. The training of human resources in the public service is meant to equip public officers with the skills and competencies necessary for their work performance. It was established that most 355 (66.0%) institutions trained less than one-third 62, 303 (26.9%) of their officers, with most (81.5%) of the training funded by the Government. Article 232 (1) (i) on the values and principles of the public service requires the affording of adequate and equal opportunities for training of men and women, members of all ethnic groups and persons with disabilities at all levels of the public service. It was established that gender parity was met in the award of training opportunities, but the threshold of 5% representation of PWDs was not met. Although

officers from most of the ethnic groups received training opportunities, some members from minority ethnic groups did not benefit from the training opportunities. Training opportunities, in most cases, prepare officers for promotional appointments, and where PWDs and minority groups do not benefit, then they would not have been prepared for promotional appointments. It was also noted that most 455 (84.6%) of the public institutions evaluated did not conduct training impact assessments to determine the efficacy of the training programmes in service delivery improvements.

The public service benefits from the award of scholarships from different sources, including development partners. The scholarships build capacity and provide technical support for Kenyan public service. The scholarships are administered by the State Department for Public Service. It was established that 122 scholarships were reported to have been received and distributed by the State Department for Public Service. It was noted that most 491 (96.7%) of the institutions did not benefit from the scholarships, and the distribution of the scholarships did not benefit most (32, 71.1%) ethnic groups in the service. It was also noted that more than half (66, 54.5%) of the scholarships were awarded to male officers. However, the bulk (28, 23%) of the scholarships were awarded to officers in the National Treasury.

It is recommended that all public institutions comply with the government training policy, which requires that all public officers undergo at least a 5-day training course annually to enhance efficiency and effectiveness in service delivery, and the Training Policy be reviewed to provide a comprehensive framework for undertaking Training Impact Assessment. It is also recommended that the institutions which had not met the two-thirds gender principle, proportionate ethnic representation and the 5% progressive realization of representation of persons with disabilities on award of training opportunities ensure that the representation gaps are addressed every time training opportunities are presented. The Commission will oversee the distribution of public service scholarships per its mandate under Article 234 (1) (f) and Section 56 of the Public Service Commission Act, 2017 to ensure parity of treatment and equity in the award of training opportunities to public officers.

The Employment Act, 2007, and the Human Resource Policies and Procedures Manual, 2016, provide for different types of leaves which employees are eligible for. Leave may be granted to employees to enable them to rejuvenate and regain their work vigor or on other circumstances provided for on other types of leaves. All employees must take their prescribed annual leave and not commute or forfeit them as it is healthy for a balanced life work cycle. It was established that most 425 (79.3%) of the institutions evaluated approved annual leave for their officers, and most 150,564 (62.6%) officers complied with the policy on utilization of annual leave. It was noted that one-third 39,764 (37.4%) of the officers did not utilize their leave, and the department where most 8,020 (20.2%) of the officers failed to utilize their leave was the State Department for Immigration and Citizen Services. It is recommended that all public institutions implement the policy on full utilization of leave by public officers by 30th June 2025, and the State Department for Immigration and Citizen Services to explain the circumstances under which most of their officers failed to take their annual leave.

Article 234 (2) (b) mandates the Commission to exercise disciplinary control over and remove persons holding or acting in public offices. The exercise of disciplinary control is further provided for under Part XII of the Public Service Commission Act, 2017 and Part IX of the PRC Regulations, 2020. It was established that more than one-third 210 (39.2%) of the evaluated institutions had reported undertaking disciplinary action, and the officers who underwent disciplinary process were few 4,091 (1.8%). The most prevalent misconducts were negligence of duty, absence from duty without permission and falsification of records. The most prevalent sanction was a warning, followed by summary dismissal and surcharge. The most prevalent alternative remedial sanction was guidance and counselling, followed by an employee assistance and performance improvement programme. Most 2,372 (58%) of the disciplinary cases had no completion dates. Hence, it was not possible to determine compliance with the six-month completion timeline except for 1,109 (27.1%) cases. The most 1,607 (39.3%) preferred mode of communicating disciplinary decisions was physical mail followed by phone calls and e-mails.

It is recommended that all public institutions ensure the timely completion of disciplinary cases, institute measures to check for

negligence of duty, absence from duty, and falsification of records, maintain an updated database of disciplinary cases in conformity with the discipline procedures, and adopt modes of communication of disciplinary decisions that provide audit trails for ease of confirmation of receipt of communication.

Public officers exit service in various ways, including resignations, retirements, dismissals, and deaths. It was established that few 8,411 (3.6%) officers exited service, with most exits arising from retirements and end of contract. It was also noted that 174 (54.5%) of the evaluated institutions reported to have conducted exit interviews, although less than half (3,705, 44%) of the officers exiting were interviewed. It is recommended that all public institutions institutionalize the conduct of exit interviews and utilize opportunities presented through the exit to redress gender, ethnic and disability representation in the service.

Public officers who retire from service are eligible for pension payments in accordance with their terms of service. Most public officers serve on permanent and pensionable terms and are eligible for pension payment under the Pension Act. This pension payments are managed and administered by the National Treasury. It was established that most 1,159 (56.6%) of the files for pension payments were submitted to the Pensions Department outside the nine-month period required under the Public Service Commission Human Resource and Procedures Manual, 2016. No information on pensions processing was submitted for almost half (802, 42.3%) of the eligible cases. Most 1,185 (57.9%) of the officers eligible for payment had not been paid their pension benefits. The Pension Department did not process and pay pension claims carried forward from 2022/2023 FY even though the Government had allocated sufficient funds for clearance of the pension claims.

It is recommended that the Pension Department to explain the circumstances under which the pension claims were carried forward and those which had been processed were not paid yet the government had provided sufficient funds for clearance of the payments. Public institutions which delayed timely submission of pension files, failed to submit information on the status of pension payments and those whose pension payments were pending to explain the delay and failure.

The overall performance index for the thematic area of performance management was 41.4%. Few institutions (89, 17.5%) were rated as high achievers at 70.0% while most of the institutions (323, 63.6%) were rated as medium achievers at 42.5% and (96, 18.9%) were rated as low achievers at 11.1%.

Article 232 (1) (g) (h) and (i) on values and principles of the public service provides for fair competition and merit as the basis for appointment and promotion in the public service, subject to representation of Kenya's diverse communities and the affording of adequate and equal opportunities in appointment, training, and advancement of men and women, members of all ethnic groups, and persons with disabilities.

Gender representation at all levels of the public service was one of the parameters evaluated for compliance with constitutional thresholds of two-thirds gender representation. It was established that gender representation was attained at the global level except for some (80, 14.9%) institutions. It is recommended that the institutions which have attained the two-thirds gender principle to work towards attainment of gender parity at 50:50 to fulfil the Convention Against Elimination of All forms of Discrimination against Women (CEDAW) which is a state obligation under article 2 (6) and 132 (2) (c) (iii). For those who are yet to attain the two-thirds gender principle at all levels to implement the prescribed affirmative action programme (2024/25 – 2026/27) proposed for their institution by the Commission.

The public service is required to promote representation of persons with disabilities by onboarding PWDs progressively to attain the 5% representation. It was established that representation of PWDs in the public service was at 4,068 (1.8%) meaning the 5% constitutional threshold had not been attained. There was however an improvement of 0.3%, from the 1.5% representation reported during the FY 2022/2023. The institutions which are yet to attain the 5% threshold principle at all levels to implement the prescribed affirmative action programme (2024/25 – 2026/27) proposed for their institution by the Commission.

Article 10 (2) (b) of the Constitution on national values and principles of governance provide for the principles of inclusiveness, equality, human rights, non-discrimination and protection of the marginalized. Section 10 of the Public Service Values and Principles

Act 2015 and Section 10 of the Framework for Implementation of values and principles provide legal and policy guidelines on the implementation of affirmative action measures for proportionate representation of ethnic groups in the public service. It was established that overall, the 43 ethnic groups were represented in the public service. On proportionate representation of ethnic communities in the institutions, most 39 (86.7%) of the communities had normal representation but some communities were overrepresented and others underrepresented at 2 (4.4%) and 4 (8.9%) respectively. 29 (5.4%) institutions had over 50% representation of one ethnic group.

Public Officers are eligible for promotions in accordance with relevant career progression guidelines contained in the human resource management and development plans. It was established that gender parity was met in award of promotional opportunities but the 5% threshold on representation of persons with disabilities was not met. Although officers from most of the ethnic groups were accorded promotional opportunities, officers from some minority ethnic groups did not benefit.

It is recommended that the institutions which are yet to attain the proportionate representation of all ethnic groups to implement the prescribed affirmative action programme (2024/25–2026/27) proposed for their institution by the Commission.

Article 250 (4) of the Constitution provides that appointments to the Commissions and Independent Offices shall take into account the national values mentioned in Articles 10 and the principle that the composition of the commissions and offices, taken as a whole, shall reflect the regional and ethnic diversity of the people of Kenya. The same principle is applicable to Boards and Councils whose composition are similar in number and functions to constitutional commissions and independent offices. The same principle may also apply to the collectivity of appointment of state officers. The representativeness of Commissions, Boards and Councils was evaluated separately.

It was established that the two-thirds gender threshold was not met in the constitution of Boards of State Corporations and SAGAs. The 5% threshold of PWD representation was also not met while some ethnic communities were not represented. It was also established that some ethnic communities were overrepresented and others underrepresented. It is recommended that the Head of Public Service and the appointing authorities for commissions, boards, councils and state offices to develop affirmative action framework for appointment of the commissions, boards, council members and state offices to promote compliance with the constitutional threshold on representation in Article 250(4).

The Commission implements Public Service Internship Programme (PSIP). The Commission recruited 8,012 interns in the FY 2022/2023 out of whom 124 (1.5%) were PWDs and members from 33 ethnic groups were represented while 12 minority ethnic groups were not represented. Gender parity was met in the recruitment.

It is recommended that deliberate measures be put in place to promote recruitments of PWDs to meet the 5% representation threshold and affirmative action programmes be developed to on-board members of all ethnic groups in all appointments where the numbers allow.

Article 10 (2) (b) of the Constitution provides for National Values and Principles of Governance which include values and principles social justice, non-discrimination and protection of the marginalized. Article 56 of the Constitution requires the state to put in place affirmative action programmes to ensure that the minorities and marginalized groups are provided with special opportunities in economic fields. Access to Government Procurement Opportunities (AGPO) programme is an affirmative action measure aimed at empowering the youth, women and PWD owned enterprises.

It was established that most (77.8%) of the evaluated institutions awarded tenders to special groups even though none of them complied with the 30% allocation threshold. It was however noted that the value of some tenders awarded was not provided and a significant amount of funds were awarded to unspecified groups. The National Treasury did not provide an inventory of registered special groups and therefore the equitable distribution of procurement opportunities to special groups could not be ascertained.

It is recommended that all public institutions to set aside and comply with the 30% allocation requirement to special groups and the National Treasury provide an inventory of registered special groups as

and when required for the evaluation. It is also recommended that the Auditor General undertake a special audit on public institutions which allocated tenders to unspecified groups.

The Government operates bursary schemes targeting secondary school students which are administered through different organizations and agencies. The bursary schemes are awarded to different categories of beneficiaries including vulnerable children, orphans, children with disabilities and children from needy households. The institutions through which the bursaries are administered are National Government-Constituency Development Fund (NG-CDF), National Government Affirmative Action Fund (NGAAF), Elimu Scholarship, Presidential Secondary School Bursary Fund, and other bursary schemes administered under the devolved governments.

It was established that a total of KSh. 17.6B was distributed to a total of 996,291 (23.9%) secondary school students in 11,153 secondary schools. The students were 496,837 (49.9%) male and 498,090 (50.1%) female and 1141 (0.1%) PWDs from NGAAF report. The other agencies did not provide data on PWD beneficiaries. NG-CDF did not provide data on distribution of bursaries by individual beneficiaries, institution, ethnicity and PWD status even though the bulk KSh. 14.6B (83%) of the bursaries was distributed through NG-CDF. It was also noted that some of the beneficiaries from the NGAAF scheme were from primary schools and some benefited more than once from the bursaries. There were disparities in the distribution of bursaries by the different schemes across counties including some counties benefiting more than others.

It is recommended that government consolidates all bursary funds for ease of administration and monitoring and bursary awards be restricted to secondary school students only since the other levels of learning are catered for under separate funding programmes by government. This will help avoid duplication of payments to the same students under different programmes. It is also recommended that a policy framework be developed to guide the distribution of bursary funds to ensure equitable share to population in all counties by gender, ethnicity and PWDs.

The State Department for Higher Education distributed 394 scholarships from 9 countries and the Commonwealth. More than half (200, 50.8%) of the scholarships were offered by Hungary. The evaluation sought to establish the equitable distribution of the scholarships by county, gender, ethnicity and PWD status. It was established that more male than female students were awarded scholarships. No data was provided on the distribution of scholarships by ethnicity and PWD status. The cost of the scholarships was also not provided. Even though all counties benefited from the scholarships, there was skewed distribution of the scholarships across the counties.

It is recommended that the State Department for Higher Education develop policy guidelines for the award of scholarships that promote the equitable distribution of the scholarships by county, gender, PWD status and ethnicity and maintain an updated data base of the same accessible to members of the public.

The Higher Education Loans Board (HELB) is established under the Higher Education Loans Board Act, Cap 213A with the mandate to process and award loans and scholarships to Kenyan students pursuing higher education. The evaluation sought to establish the equitable distribution of loans to students in by county, gender, ethnicity and PWD status. It was established that majority (95%) of public universities received disbursements from the Higher Education Loans Board amounting to KSh. 8.84B. It was noted that students from private universities and colleges received loans from Higher Education Loans Board and some private universities received student loans in excess of most public universities. It was also noted that the list of beneficiaries was not disaggregated by County, gender, ethnicity and PWD status.

It is recommended that the State Department for Higher Education to review the loan framework for university students and the eligibility of disbursements to students enrolled in private universities in order to help recapitalize public universities experiencing funding challenges. The Higher Education Loans Board to develop criteria for equitable disbursement of loans.

Students in TVET institutions benefit from capitation and scholarships. The evaluation sought to establish the status of allocation of capitation and scholarships by county, gender, ethnicity and disability status. It was established that most of the TVET institutions received capitation and scholarships. The gender parity was met in the awards and some students with disabilities benefited from the awards.

It was however noted that students from some ethnic communities did not benefit from awards and the ethnic details of some of the students were not indicated. It is recommended that the State Department for TVET develop an affirmative action framework and maintain an updated data base of allocation of capitation and scholarships to students in terms of gender, ethnicity and PWD in order to promote inclusivity in the distribution of capitation and scholarships.

Over the years, the government has implemented social empowerment and protection programmes aimed at realizing Article 10(2)(b) on human dignity, equity and equality, social justice, non-discrimination and protection of the marginalized. The programmes target the most vulnerable in our society including women, youth, persons with disabilities and the elderly.

The social protection programmes are run by the State Department for Social Protection and citizen affairs, National Drought Management Authority (NDMA), the Kenya Youth Employment Opportunities Project and the National Government Affirmative Action Fund. The programmes target the most vulnerable in society including orphans and vulnerable children, persons with severe disabilities, the elderly and vulnerable and poor households.

The evaluation sought to establish the status of distribution of social protection benefits by county, gender, ethnicity and disability status. It was established that the total registered beneficiaries were 2,687,642 out of whom 1,739,919 (64.7%) benefited from a disbursement of 26.1B. The beneficiaries comprised of 591,733 (34%) male and 1,148,186 (66%) female. It was however noted that there were inconsistencies between the amounts disbursed and the number of beneficiaries for the Inua Jamii programmes. It was also noted that the State Department did not undertake awareness sensitization to citizens and the programme.

It is therefore recommended that the State Department for Social Protection and Citizen Services develops a framework incorporating expansion plans on disbursements and providing for equitable share of the disbursements across counties by gender and ethnicity. The State Department to also undertake awareness sensitization to citizens on the Social Protection programme by 30th June 2025 and continually maintain an updated data base of beneficiaries disaggregated by county, gender, ethnicity and PWD status.

The Government also runs The Hunger Safety Net Programme (HSNP) under the State Department for ASALs, National Drought Management Authority (NDMA). The programme provides unconditional cash transfer to support some of the most vulnerable and poor households in the eight poorest and arid counties of Turkana, Wajir, Mandera, Marsabit, Garissa, Tana River, Isiolo, and Samburu in Northern Kenya. It was established that 133,476 beneficiaries received stipends worth Kshs 4.32B, with each household receiving Kshs 2,700 per month. It was however noted that some beneficiaries shared the same identification numbers and the list of beneficiaries disaggregated by ethnicity was not provided.

It is recommended that the State Department for ASAL and the National Drought Management Authority undertake an audit on beneficiaries of the fund in light of duplication of beneficiary identities and maintain an updated database of beneficiaries disaggregated by ethnicity.

Social empowerment programmes are implemented through capacity-building, access to job markets, marketing of products, provision of affordable loans and grants. The programmes target women, youth and persons with disabilities. The programmes implemented under the social empowerment programmes include Studio Mashinani, Kenya Youth Employment and Opportunities Project (KYEOP), Empowering Novel Agribusiness Led Employment Youth Kenya Programme, Uwezo Fund, Youth Enterprise Development Fund and NGAFF special groups. The evaluation sought to establish the status of distribution of opportunities under the social empowerment programmes by county, gender, ethnicity and PWD status.

Studio Mashinani is a project through which the Government has established recording studios at the grassroots targeting talented youths. The project aims at enhancing the availability of recording studios and enhancement of self-employment opportunities for youthful artists in the robust creative music industry. It was established that few (12.8%) counties benefited from the studios with 529 persons from 17 Counties benefiting. Most of the beneficiaries were male (77.1%) and no data was available on PWD status of the beneficiaries. It was noted that some of the beneficiaries were not in the youth bracket and some had been registered using shared identification numbers.

Kenya Broadcasting Corporation had not undertaken any sensitization to create awareness and impact evaluation on the efficiency and efficacy of the programme. It is recommended that KBC establish Studios in the 47 counties with a priority on rural counties by 30th June 2026 and undertake sensitization programmes to create awareness on Studio Mashinani programme by 30th June 2025.

Kenya Youth Employment and Opportunities Project (KYEOP) is a World Bank-funded transformational project that aims to empower the youth in Kenya by equipping them with essential training, internship and business grant opportunities. The main objective of KYEOP is to increase employment and earning opportunities among targeted young people across Kenya. The evaluation sought to establish the number of youths who benefitted from the programme by county, gender, ethnicity and disability status. It was established that there was gender parity in the award of grants and most of the counties (63.8%) and ethnic communities (51.1%) did not benefit from the grants. It is recommended that the State Department of Micro Small and Medium Enterprises take affirmative action measures to ensure that all the counties and ethnic communities benefit from youth empowerment programmes in order to promote equity.

The Empowering Novel Agribusiness Led Employment (ENABLE) Youth Kenya Programme is a skills and capacity development program for unemployed graduate youth. The youths are divided into two categories. The first are unemployed graduates who have completed post-secondary education (incubation). The second group are graduate youths who are already engaged in agribusiness but have no or limited access to commercial loan to grow their businesses (acceleration). The evaluation sought to establish the number of youths who benefitted from the programme by county, gender, ethnicity and disability status. It was established. Most (70.4%) of the beneficiaries were male. Two marginalized counties (Lamu and Tana River) and most (55.6%) of the ethnic communities did not benefit from the programme.

It is recommended that the State Department for Agriculture take affirmative action measures to promote gender, ethnic, PWD and county equity in the distribution of benefits, maintain an updated database of information.

Uwezo Fund is a flagship programme in the Kenya Vision 2030 aimed at enabling women, youth and persons with disabilities access finances. The finances are meant to promote business enterprises at the constituency level. The evaluation sought to establish the number of youths who benefitted from the programme by county, gender, ethnicity and disability status. It was established that some (25, 0.6%) of the beneficiaries were not identified with any group, some (0.6%) of the funds were disbursed to unidentified groups and purpose for which some (5.8%) funds were disbursed was not indicated. Some (23.4%) of the counties did not benefit from the funding. It is recommended that The State Department for Micro Small and Medium Enterprise Development (MSME) and UWEZO fund to conduct due diligence on the administration of the funds and establish circumstances under which individuals were funded outside the group system and take necessary action to recover any funds that could have been lost.

The Youth Enterprise Development Fund (YEDF) was established through the Public Financial Management Act (The Youth Enterprise Development Fund) Regulations (2006), Legal Notice No. 167/2006, to champion the creation of employment for youth through enterprise development. In 2007, the Fund was transformed into a State Corporation under the then Ministry of State for Youth Affairs. The evaluation sought to establish the number of youths who benefitted from the programme by county, gender, ethnicity and disability status. It was established that most (97.9%) of the counties benefited from the disbursement of funds to youth groups while some (27.7%) counties did not benefit from the disbursement of the fund to individual youths. It was also noted that gender parity was attained in the disbursement of the funds. There was however duplication of IDs of some of the beneficiaries.

It is recommended that the State Department for MSME to develop affirmative action programme to promote equity in identification and disbursement of youth empowerment funds across the 47 counties, gender, ethnicity and PWDs.

The National Government Affirmative Action Fund was established in 2014/2015 FY through Legal Notice No. 52 of the Public Finance Management Act No 18 of 2012 with the aim of empowering vulnerable groups namely, women, youth, persons with disabilities (PWDs), vulnerable children, and elderly persons through

expanding access to financial facilities for the promotion of enterprise development and provision of social development services at the constituency and county levels. The evaluation sought to establish the number of youths who benefitted from the programme by county, gender, ethnicity and disability status. It was established that Most of the counties (31, 66%) and ethnic communities (62.2%) did not benefit from NGAAF support. It was also noted that names were not provided for some of the beneficiaries.

Additionally, 4,392 groups were supported through grants. However, 13 counties did not benefit from the support for affirmative action groups while registration details for 2,656 groups were not provided yet this was a requirement for a group to be officially recognized and supported.

It is recommended that NGAAF develop affirmative action programme to promote equity in identification and disbursement of affirmative action funds across the 47 counties, disaggregated by gender, ethnicity and PWDs for both the individuals and groups. It is also recommended that NGAAF conducts due diligence on eligible beneficiaries, maintain an updated database of all beneficiaries. It is further recommended that NGAAF liaise with the State Department for Social Protection to authenticate the details of registered groups.

The Equalization Fund is established under Article 204 of the Constitution. It has a lifespan of 20 years from the date of promulgation of the Constitution. The funds from the Equalization Fund are supposed to be utilized to provide basic services including water, roads, health facilities, and electricity in the marginalised areas. This is meant to bring the marginalised areas at par with the rest of the country in terms of development.

The evaluation sought to establish the status of programmes funded under the equalization fund. It was established that most of the funds released were utilized for administrative costs. The State Department for Water and Sanitation received disbursement from the National Treasury on equalization fund which it reported to have used to settle pending bills in seven counties but the specific projects where the funds were utilized were not provided. There are only six years remaining out of the 20 provided for in the constitution for the implementation of the fund but there is no information readily available on the programmes and projects that have been implemented.

It is recommended that The National Treasury and Equalization Fund Secretariat provide information on the status of implementation of the equalization fund projects since inception by 30th June, 2025 and stop the expenditure of the funds on administrative services where no projects are being implemented.

It is also recommended that all institutions that had not conducted impact evaluation on the programs they run to do so by 30th June, 2025 to ascertain their efficiency, efficacy and sustainability.

The overall performance index for the thematic area of equitable allocation of opportunities and resources was 43.4%. 81 institutions were rated as high achievers with a mean score of 64.9%, 349 were rated as medium achievers (mean 44%) while 78 were rated as low achievers (mean 18%).

Public participation is a requirement under Article 10 (1) (c) of the Constitution on National Values and Principles of Governance, which binds all persons whenever they make or implement public policy decisions and Article 10 (2) (a) on participation of the people. Article 232 (1) (d) of the Constitution is on Values and Principles of the Public Service, which provides for involvement of the people in the process of policy making. Public participation is further guided by Sections 11 and 12 of the Public Service (Values and Principles) Act, 2015 and the Public Service Commission Framework for Implementation of Values and Principles in the Public Service, 2015.

Public institutions are required to undertake public participation whenever they formulate public policies. Institutions are expected to engage the public on the contents of the proposed policy by according the public adequate opportunity to review and make comments on the draft policy, be heard by the makers of the policy and be notified of the final policy and whether their views were incorporated.

The evaluation sought to establish the number of institutions that had customized the Public Service Commission Guidelines on public participation as recommended in the 2022/2023 Values and Principles Report and the number that developed policies or legislations. It was

established that most (93.3%) of the institutions evaluated had not customized the Public Service Commission guidelines on public participation. It was also noted that less than half (46.7%) of the evaluated institutions developed policies and less than one-third (22.8%) subjected the policies to public participation. Half (50%) of the institutions which undertook public participation on their policies did not give reasonable time to their stakeholders to familiarize themselves with the policies and most of the institutions subjected the policies to stake holder validation after public participation. It is recommended that Parliament fast-tracks the enactment of the Public Participation Bill to facilitate ease of compliance and enforcement of public participation in policy making.

The Commission is mandated to ensure that the public service is efficient and effective under Article 234 (2) (e) of the Constitution. Article 232 (1) (b) mandates the Commission to promote the values and principles of efficiency, effectiveness and economic use of resources.

The Constitution mandates public institutions to prepare and implement budgets for effective execution of government programmes and projects. The national budget, which is an estimate of government revenue and expenditure for a financial year, is a key instrument for the execution of government operations, programmes and development projects. The evaluation sought to establish the efficiency with which government operations, programmes and development projects were implemented and the timely attainment of planned results, status of implementation of planned and budgeted programmes. It was established that more than half (56.3%) of the evaluated institutions implemented planned programmes although programme implementation levels were low. It was also established that less than one-third (9.8%) of the evaluated institutions fully utilized their project budgets and (11.5%) of the institutions spent funds in excess of allocations. Most (57.9%) of the evaluated institutions did not report on implementation of development projects. Less than one-third (18.9%) of the implemented projects were completed on time and at planned cost. More than half (58.0%) of the projects had feasibility studies undertaken while most (62.6%) of the projects implemented had undergone Environmental Impact Assessments. It is recommended that all public institutions maintain an updated database of development projects they implement, ensure timely implementation of projects at planned costs and subject development projects to feasibility studies and environment impact assessment before implementation.

One of the ways of assessing fiscal discipline and budget sustainability is through monitoring and evaluation of budget implementation. It was established that most (77.9%) of the evaluated institutions received recurrent and development funds. Half (50.9%) of the institutions evaluated did not comply with the prescribed Personnel Emoluments to Operation and Maintenance budget ratio of 65:35 while less than one third (13.3%) of the institutions failed to comply with the 70:30 recurrent to development budget ratio. Most of the evaluated institutions did not achieve 100% absorption level of the total budget. It was noted that a significant percentage of the total budget was used on what was reported as Corporate Social Responsibility activities.

It is recommended that the National Treasury and Parliament develop a framework on financing of Corporate Social Responsibility activities by public institutions to curb abuse and wastage of funds. It is also recommended that all public institutions with development budgets maintain the recurrent to development ratios of 70:30 and ensure 100% budget absorption.

Section 155 of the Public Procurement and Asset Disposal Act, 2015 requires Authorized Officers to prioritize the procurement of goods, materials, and supplies that are entirely manufactured, mined, or produced within Kenya. This requirement aligns with the values and principles provided in Articles 10 and 232 of the Kenyan Constitution and the Bottom-Up Economic Transformation Agenda (BETA), which promote patriotism, economic self-sufficiency, and sustainable development through support for local industry.

The Buy Kenya - Build Kenya Strategy complements these constitutional ideals by requiring public institutions to allocate at least 40% of their procurement budgets for the purchase of locally produced goods and services. By doing so, the strategy supports Kenyan industries, particularly small and medium enterprises, thereby fostering social equity and economic inclusion through the creation of more local jobs. The evaluation sought to establish the number of

institutions that implemented the Buy Kenya-Build Kenya Strategy. It was established that most (73.4%) of the institutions implemented the Buy Kenya-Build Kenya Strategy policy initiative and over half (53.3%) of the institutions complied with the 40% allocation requirement. However, the least (11%) compliant service sector was Ministries and State Departments. It is recommended that all public institutions comply with the Buy Kenya-Build Kenya policy by 30th June 2025 and the Buy Kenya-Build Kenya Strategy be recast to read Buy Kenya-Build Kenya Strategy.

The Public Procurement and Asset Disposal Act, 2015, the Public Procurement and Asset Disposal regulations, 2020 and the Executive Order No. 2 of 2018 directs all procuring entities to disclose public procurement and asset disposal information and submit reports on public procurement and asset disposal transactions to the PPRA. The PPI portal was introduced as a procurement system that promotes efficiency, effectiveness, fairness, transparency and objectivity in the procurement process.

Section 93 of the Public Procurement and Disposal Act 2015 requires accounting officers to undertake pre-qualification of suppliers for purposes of identifying the most qualified firms for prequalification of goods, services and works. Those prequalified are listed in the Public Procurement Information Portal (PIIP). The evaluation sought to establish the number of institutions that pre-qualified and registered suppliers on the PPI portal. It was established that less than one-third (15%) of the institutions had a valid list of pre-qualified suppliers and less than half (45.7%) of the institutions had registered pre-qualified suppliers in PIIP. It is recommended that all public institutions that had not prequalified suppliers pre-qualify suppliers and register them on the PPI portal by 30th June, 2025.

The Executive Order No. 2 of 2018 amplifies Section 138 of the Act and directs public institutions to publish tender opportunities and the resultant contract award details in the Public Procurement Information Portal by every 15th of the subsequent month. All public institutions are required under the policy to register and undertake all procurement transactions through the portal. The evaluation sought to establish the number of institutions that had migrated their procurement services to the Public Procurement Information Portal. It was established that most (77.2%) of the public institutions evaluated had migrated their procurement to PIIP and were advertising their tenders on the platform. It is recommended that all public institutions that had not migrated their procurement to PIIP system to migrate their procurement processes and undertake all their tendering through the system by 30th June, 2025.

Section 27 of the PPAD Act, 2015 establishes the Public Procurement Appeals Regulatory Board. The Board is mandated to review, hear and determine tendering and asset disposal disputes as provided under Section 28 of the Act. One of the ways of assessing efficiency, transparency, fairness, objectivity and accountability of implementation of procurement processes is the number of appeals and litigations arising from the process. The evaluation sought to establish the number of institutions that lodged appeals with PPARB, the number of contracts and tender values, and the status of adjudication and decisions. It was established that most (92.5%) of the evaluated institutions did not report any appeals against their procurement decisions. Most (70%) of the decisions made were communicated in time. It was noted that some of the suppliers lodged their appeals out of time.

The 2022/23 Values and Principles compliance evaluation Report recommended that all public institutions endeavour to customize the Policy on Asset and Liability Management in the public sector (2020) by June 2024. The requirement to have a customized Policy on Asset and Liability Management is meant to bring uniformity and standardization in the management of assets and liabilities across the public sector in a manner that is consistent with Government policies, priorities and objectives aligned to internationally recognized/accepted standards. The policy on asset and liability management is meant to promote accountability, transparency and sustainable use of resources. The inventory of public asset serves to create a repository of information on public property and hence provide a basis for the protection and preservation of the property for posterity. It was established that most of the institutions (89.8%) had not customized the policy on assets and liability management in the public sector. It was also established that most of the institutions (78.5%) had not undertaken assets valuation and preparation of valuation rolls. It is recommended that all public institutions which had not customized the policy on Assets and Liability Management in the public sector customize the policy and undertake assets valuations, prepare valuation rolls and deposit the rolls with the National Treasury by 30th June 2025.

The Office of the Auditor-General is an independent Office established under Article 229 of the Constitution of Kenya. The Auditor General is mandated to audit and report in respect of each financial year on the accounts of the National and County Governments. Article 229 (5) provides that the Auditor General may audit and report on the accounts of any entity that is funded from Public Funds. The Auditor General audits expenditure by public institutions on an annual basis and files a report to Parliament. PAC and PIC review the reports and engage the cited public institutions on areas of non-compliance. Audit services and audit reports are critical in monitoring and evaluating the outcome and impact of the management and use of public resources.

After auditing, the Auditor General expresses an opinion on the financial position. This may be an Unqualified Opinion which means the Auditor General found no issue with the financial statement of the institution. A Qualified Opinion means that the institution had not complied with the General Acceptable Accounting Principles and Standards. A Disclaimer means the Auditor General did not get enough information to form an opinion and an adverse Opinion is where the Auditor General may have found financial misappropriation, fraud and other irregularities, including inconsistencies in the financial statements. The evaluation sought to establish the number of institutions that were audited by the Auditor-General in the 2022/23 FY. It was established that most of the evaluated institutions had not been audited by the office of the Auditor General. Most (124, 59%) of the audited institutions had qualified opinion. It was also noted that most (196, 96%) of the TVETs and (35, 69%) Ministries and State Departments were not audited in 2022/2023 FY.

The Public Accounts Committee and the Public Investments Committee are parliamentary committees established under Standing Order 205 and No. 206. The Public Accounts Committee and the Public Investment Committee are committees of Parliament which oversight the proper use of public funds and implementation of public projects by public entities. The evaluation sought to establish the status of implementation of previous recommendations of PAC and PIC reports by the affected public entities. It was established that most (472, 92.9%) institutions evaluated had no recommendations from Public Accounts Committee and most (174, 61.1%) of the recommendations were implemented by the affected institutions. It was noted that more than half (245, 58.3%) of the recommendations made by PIC were implemented. It is recommended that all public institutions which failed to implement PAC and PIC recommendations to implement the recommendations by 30th June 2025.

The overall performance index for the thematic area of efficiency, effectiveness and economic use of resources and sustainable development was 43.3%. 82 institutions were rated as high achievers with a mean score of 72%, 322 were rated as medium achievers (mean 47.1%) while 104 were rated as low achievers (mean 8.9%).

The overall compliance index for all the 508 institutions evaluated was 43.8% compared to 46.0% in the previous year evaluation (2022/2023). This was a moderate score, indicating that there was room for improvement in adherence to values and principles in Articles 10 and 232 of the Constitution. The moderate compliance levels suggest that there were gaps in the implementation of the values and principles across the evaluated institutions.

The overall implementation of recommendations derived from the Values and Principles Compliance Evaluation reports submitted to the President and Parliament over the ten-year period revealed that out of the 470 recommendations generated, only 66 (14%) were fully implemented, 70 (14.9%) were partially implemented, 140 (29.8%) were ongoing, while a substantial 194 (41.3%) were not implemented. The findings show that ongoing and partially implemented recommendations accounted for 44.7% of the total recommendations, suggesting that while there is some progress towards addressing these recommendations, the overall effectiveness and commitment to fostering a culture of accountability and integrity within the public service remain inadequate.

Overall, 85 institutions were rated as high achievers with an average compliance index of 68.8%, 326 were rated as medium achievers with an average compliance index of 45.2%, and 97 were rated as low achievers with an average compliance index of 17.6%.

1.0 INTRODUCTION

This report is prepared pursuant to Articles 234 (2) (c) and (h) of the Constitution, which require the Commission to promote, evaluate, and report to the President and Parliament on the extent to which the values and principles in Articles 10 and 232 of the Constitution are complied with in the Public Service.

The values and principles in Articles 10 and 232 were anchored in the Constitution to act as signposts to guide organizational culture and the behaviour of public servants while discharging their duties and responsibilities, as well as placing citizens in the centre of service delivery. Public organizations and public officers are required to apply the values and principles as they discharge their day-to-day activities. Therefore, The values and principles help ensure improved service delivery, consistency in the service standards across public organizations, equity, equality and inclusion, national cohesion, efficiency, and effectiveness of the public service.

In executing this critical mandate, the Commission is guided by several enabling legislations, policies, regulations, and guidelines. These include: the Constitution, the Public Service (Values and Principles) Act, 2015, the Public Service Commission Act 2017, the Leadership and Integrity Act, 2012, the Public Officer Ethics Act 2003, the Public Finance Management Act 2012, the Public Procurement and Asset Disposal Act, 2005, the Public Procurement and Asset Disposal regulations, 2020, the Public Service Commission (Performance Management) Regulations 2021, the National Values Policy, Sessional Paper Number 8 of 2013, the Framework for Implementing Values and Principles in Articles 10 and 232 of the Constitution in 2015, Kenya Vision 2030, the Bottom-Up Economic Transformation Agenda 2022-2027, Sessional Paper No. 9 of 2013 on National Cohesion and Integration, the National Policy for Peace Building and Conflict Management (Sessional Paper No. 5 of 2014), the National Policy on Gender and Development (Sessional Paper No.2 of 2019), the Kenya Youth Development Policy 2019 and the National Land Use Policy (Sessional Paper No. 1 of 2017). These frameworks serve as a foundation, providing essential direction and support for the Commission's efforts to realize and promote the values and principles outlined in the Constitution.

1.1 The Mandate of the Public Service Commission

The Commission is established under Article 233 of the Constitution and comprises of a chairperson, vice chairperson and seven other members appointed by the President with the approval of the National Assembly. Its powers functions prescribed in Article 234.

The powers and functions of the Commission include: establishing and abolishing offices in the public service, appointing persons to hold or act in those offices, confirming appointments and exercising disciplinary control over and removing persons holding or acting in public offices.

The Commission is also responsible for promoting the values and principles in Articles 10 and 232 throughout the public service, evaluating and reporting to the President and Parliament on the extent to which the said values and principles in Articles are complied with in the public service, investigating, monitoring and evaluating the organization, administration and personnel practices of the public service, ensuring that the public service is efficient and effective and developing human resources in the public service.

In addition, the Commission is charged with reviewing and make recommendations to the national government in respect of conditions of service, code of conduct and qualifications of officers in the public service, hearing and determine appeals in respect of county governments' public service and performing any other functions and exercise any other powers conferred by national legislation. Other constitutional responsibilities include recommending to the President persons to be appointed as Principal Secretaries (Article 155) and processing petitions for removal of the Director of Public Prosecutions (Article 158).

Some of the functions conferred by the legislation include the administration of the declaration of income, assets and liabilities under the Public Officer Ethics Act, 2003. Although this was enacted before the promulgation of the current Constitution, speaks generally to the values in Articles 10 and 232.

1.2 The National Values and Principles of Governance

Article 10 (1) of the Constitution provides that the national values and principles of governance in this Article bind all State organs, State officers, public officers and all persons whenever any of them apply or interpret the Constitution, enact, apply or interpret any law; or make or implement public policy decisions. The values are in four clusters. The first cluster is on nationhood and includes patriotism, national unity, sharing and devolution of power, the rule of law, democracy and participation of the people; the second is people-centred and includes human dignity, equity, social justice, inclusiveness, equality, human

rights, non-discrimination and protection of the marginalized, the third is on the exercise of power donated to office holders and include: good governance, integrity, transparency and accountability; and last cluster on sustainable development is on utilization of resources for the benefit of not only the present generation but and future generations as well.

1.3 The Values and Principles of Public Service

The values and principles in Article 232 guide institutions on standards of service delivery and utilization of resources and diversity and inclusion. The values of service delivery standards include high standards of professional ethics and efficient, effective and economical use of resources. responsive, prompt, effective, impartial, and equitable provision of services; involvement of the people in the process of policymaking; accountability for administrative acts; transparency and provision to the public of timely and accurate information.

On diversity and inclusion, the Constitution requires that fair competition and merit be the basis for appointments and promotions in public service. However, institutions are required to ensure representation of Kenya's diverse communities and afford adequate and equal opportunities for appointment, training, and advancement at all levels of the public service to men and women, members of all ethnic groups, and persons with disabilities.

The Public Service Commission Act, 2017, provides the specifics of what the Commission is required to do in promoting, monitoring, evaluating, and reporting on values and principles. The Commission is also required to put in place programmes for promoting values and principles and integrate them into its regulations, policies, and procedures.

Article 232 of the Constitution provides the values and principles of public service. These values and principles apply to the public service in all state organs at both levels of government and all state corporations.

1.4 Promotion, Evaluation, and Reporting on Values and Principles

The Commission has adopted several strategies to promote the national values and principles of governance and values and principles of public service. These include mainstreaming the values and principles in the organizational business processes, performance management instruments, and citizen service delivery charters. The other promotional strategies used include disseminating values and principles through induction and training of public officers and the use of print and electronic media, sponsorship of relevant themes in the national music and drama festivals, awareness campaigns, advertisements, and publicity. The values and principles are also promoted through awards of honours and commendations to exemplary value carriers and drivers, as well as engagement with stakeholders such as the media, religious and faith-based organizations, and the Matatu Owners' Association, among others.

Evaluation is an assessment of the success or otherwise of implementing a programme or project against set goals or objectives. This entails a systematic and objective assessment of the implementation of the policy and programmes geared towards the implementation of the values and principles. The evaluation involves setting performance standards and indicators against specific thematic areas, data processing and analysis, interpretation of findings and recommendations. This report is derived from an analysis of qualitative and quantitative data collected through an online survey against eight thematic areas on the National Values and Principles of Governance and Values and Principles of Public Service.

The report on the progress in implementing Values and Principles is a performance accountability report for the Public Service Commission. The report's building blocks include the governance audit findings on the citizen service delivery charter, the service-wide citizen service satisfaction survey report findings, the workplace and service-wide employee satisfaction survey findings, and the service-wide corruption perception index survey findings. The report will also be informed by the reports from the other oversight institutions identified in the institutional linkages section.

The Commission evaluates the extent to which the values and principles have been complied with in the public service. It prepares a report on the measures taken, progress realized, and impediments to implementation. This is the thirteenth report that the Commission has submitted to the President and Parliament since the promulgation of the Constitution.

1.5 Scope of Application of the Values and Principles

The compliance evaluation covered all the Values and Principles in Articles 10 and 232 of the Constitution. The number of institutions targeted was 585.

The evaluation targeted 585 public institutions out of which 508 were evaluated. The evaluated institutions were drawn from six broad service sectors, which include Ministries and State Departments; State Corporations and Semi-Autonomous Government Agencies (SAGAs); Constitutional Commissions and Independent Offices not excluded under Article 234(3) of the Constitution; Public Universities; Statutory Commissions and Authorities; and Technical and Vocational Education Training Institutes.

1.6 The Evaluation of Values and Principles

The nineteen National Values and Principles of Governance in Article 10 and the nine values and principles of public service are interrelated and interconnected. For instance, the implementation of the value of accountability for administrative acts in Article 232(1) (e) relates to good governance, transparency, and accountability in Article 10(2) (c). Similarly, the participation of the people is amplified in Article 10 (2) (a) and Article 232(1) (d) of the Constitution. For purposes of evaluation, the Commission clustered similar and interrelated values and principles into eight thematic areas as follows:

- (i) Service delivery improvement;
- (ii) High standards of professional ethics in the public service;
- (iii) Good governance, transparency and accountability;
- (iv) Performance management;
- (v) Equitable allocation of opportunities and resources;
- (vi) Public participation in policy-making process;
- (vii) Efficiency, effectiveness, and economic use of resources and sustainable development; and
- (viii) Devolution and decentralization of public services.

2.0 KEY FINDINGS

2.1 Awareness on Values and Principles in Articles 10 and 232

Findings from the *Citizen Satisfaction and Impact on Service Delivery by Public Institutions* report 2024 revealed that:

- (i) 1,392 (55.6%) respondents were unaware of the values and principles. 840 (56.7%) youth were unaware of the values and principles. 427 (54.5%) respondents in the middle age bracket were unaware of the values and principles. Further, 125 (52.7%) respondents aged over 56 were not aware of the values and principles.
- (ii) Self-reading of the Constitution was the most prevalent channel through which the highest number of respondents became aware of values and principles at 24.1%, followed by learning in school at 19.2%. Other channels through which respondents became aware of values and principles were through the mainstream media and research at 13.7% and 8.7%, respectively. The least prevalent channels through which respondents became aware of values and principles were notice boards and the Huduma centers, with 0.1% and 0.3%, respectively.

2.2 Promotion of Values and Principles by Public Institutions

Regarding promotion of values and principles by public institutions, findings revealed that:

- (i) 140 (27.6%) evaluated institutions trained officers on values and principles during the 2023/2024 FY. The most popular topic covered was national and public service values and principles (54.9%), followed by ethics and integrity (20.6%). Others were public service code of conduct and ethics and leadership and governance at 9% and 4.2% respectively.
- (ii) The highest number of values training programmes were undertaken by the Ethics and Anti-Corruption Commission at 54 (14.2%). It was followed by the Public Service Commission, Kenya Revenue Authority and Huduma Secretariat with 30 (7.9%), 17 (4.5%) and 11 (2.9%) programmes respectively.

- (iii) 96 (18.9%) institutions undertook civic education on values and principles and facilitated 449 civic education programmes that benefitted 69,417 participants.
- (iv) The most popular topic discussed was leadership and good governance, with 182 (40.5%), followed by national and public service values and principles, with 119 (26.5%). Others were sustainable development with 79 (17.6%), ethics, integrity and corruption prevention with 33 (7.3%), national cohesion and integration with 26 (5.8%) and individual wellness and welfare with 10 (2.2%).
- (v) The highest number of civic education programmes was disseminated through physical presentations, with 388 (86.4%). Other forms of dissemination included both physical and virtual meetings with 16 (3.6%), virtual/online with 10 (2.2%), IEC materials with 5 (1.1%), use of documented reports with 3 (0.7%), media publication with 3 (0.7%) and email with 2 (0.4%).
- (vi) 153 (30.1%) institutions developed IEC materials on values and principles. The IEC materials developed by the highest number of institutions were brochures, with 78 (15.4%), followed by posters and flyers, with 51 (10%) and 48 (9.4%), respectively.
- (vii) 121 (24%) institutions undertook media talk shows to promote values and principles. Television was the most popular platform, hosting 260 (48%) promotional talk shows, followed by radio stations with 223 (41%). Others were face-to-face with 25 (5%), social media with 20 (4%) and webinars with 5 (1%).
- (viii) Television and radio talk shows were the frequently used promotion programmes, with 483 (89.2%), followed by public outreach with 87 (16.1%).
- (ix) 132 (26%) institutions promoted values through print media. The forms of print media used included Newspapers, Posters, Flyers, Brochures, Magazines, Booklets and Reports.
- (x) 176 (34.6%) out of 508 institutions utilized social media to promote values and principles. The three most popular social media platforms used were Facebook, with 2,120 (38%), followed by X-space, with 1,809 (32%). Others were Instagram and email, with 746 (13%) and 27 (1%) respectively.
- (xi) 124 (24.4%) out of the 508 institutions surveyed reported that they had officers who were honoured and or awarded as value carriers and drivers. The Commission on Administrative Justice (Ombudsman) was the most cited institution that recognized officers for promoting or upholding the values and principles in Articles 10 and 232 with 2 awards.
- (xii) 94 (18.5%) of the 508 institutions reported having promoted values and principles through artwork. However, none of the Constitutional Commissions and Independent Offices utilized this platform. Majority (45.5%) of the 290 artwork promotional activities were undertaken through the social media platform. This was followed by display within institutional premises at 85 (29.3%).
- (xiii) 176 (34.6%) of the 508 institutions reported to have promoted values and principles through performing arts. Drama and music formed the highest performances at 181 (40%) and 180 (40%) respectively. 257 (56.6%) of the institutions used performing arts events as forums of engagement to promote values and principles.
- (xiv) 166 (32.7%) evaluated institutions promoted values and principles through 582 sporting activities. The institution with the largest number of sports activities was the State Department for Internal Security and National Administration with 51 (8.8%) followed by the State Department for Livestock Development with 22 (3.8%), the State Department for Lands and Physical Planning with 20 (3.4%) and Shamberere National Polytechnic with 20 (3.4%). The sport that had the highest number of promotional activities was ball games with 386 (66.3%) followed by athletics with 87 (14.9%).
- (xv) 261 (51.4%) institutions promoted values and principles through participation in Public Service Week.

2.3 General Human Resource Practices

Regarding general human resource practices, findings revealed that:

- (i) Out of the 330 respondents, excluding TVETIs, 262 (79.4%) respondents reported that they had no new offices established in the past three years while 74 (22.4%) reported that they had 4,749 new offices established in the past three years.
- (ii) Out of the 74 institutions which reported to have established new offices in the past three years, 60 (88%) did not have a workload analysis in place to inform the establishment of the new offices.
- (iii) Out of the 4,749 new offices established in the past three financial years, 4,679 (98.5%) offices were established without a workload analysis being undertaken, while 70 (1.5%) offices were established after undertaking a workload analysis.
- (iv) A total of 319 (96.7%) of the organizations indicated that their staff establishment were informed by an approved organizational structure. Out of the 319 organizations, 309 (96.9%) submitted their staff establishments;
- (v) There were 310,735 posts in the approved establishments in 309 evaluated institutions. 197,395 (63.5%) posts were filled while 113,340 (36.5%) were vacant.
- (vi) The staff recorded in the staff register exceeded the number of staff reported to be in-post against the authorised establishment by 17,000.
- (vii) Five (1.5%) institutions had optimal staffing levels in their establishment; these were the State Department for Devolution, the State Department for Wildlife, Kenya National Assurance (2001) Company, the National Syndemic Diseases Control Council and the Policyholders Compensation Fund.
- (viii) Out of the 168 (33.1%) institutions which were over-established, 6(3.6%) were over-established by more than 30 %. Of the 335 (65.9%) under-established institutions, 110 (32.8%) were under-established by more than -50% and 38 (11.3%) were grossly under-established at over -70%.
- (ix) Staff establishments for 11(3.3%) institutions were not informed by approved organization structures. Staff establishments for TVETIs were however not included in the evaluation as they are yet to be determined.
- (x) The list of officers submitted by institutions, disaggregated by terms of service, differed by 10,769 from the staff in the biodata as submitted by the same institutions. The number in the staff biodata was 231,830, while the total number of officers in the submitted list was 242,599.
- (xi) 180,440 (77.8%) officers were serving on permanent and pensionable terms of service, while 38,837 (16.8%) were on fixed-term contracts. 2,106 (0.9%) public officers served on permanent terms without pension while 6,533 (2.8%) officers were serving on probation.
- (xii) 536 evaluated institutions reported to have 231,830 officers out of whom 9,371(4.0%) in 142 (26.5%) institutions were temporary staff. Further, 259 (48.3%) institutions reported having engaged 15,127 casuals. However, the institutions submitted a list of 84,609 casual employees, which presented a variance of 69,482.
- (xiii) The institutions that engaged the highest number of casuals were Kenya Power and Lightning Company, 53,436 (63.42%), followed by Kenya Railways Corporation, 14,465 (17.17%).
- (xiv) The majority, 141,628 (61.1%), of public officers are aged between 19 and 46. The number of officers aged above 60 was 3,323 (1.4%), out of which 1900 were lecturers and PWDs whose retirement age is 70 and 65, respectively. There were 1,423 officers serving beyond their retirement age of 60. The average age of officers across the service sectors was 42.8 years, with a median age of 42 and a standard deviation of 9.9.

- (xv) 62 (11.6%) institutions reported having a total of 2,076 (0.9%) officers paid outside the payroll. Of the officers paid outside payroll, 411 (19.8%) were accounted for in the staff bio-data, while 1,665 (80.2%) were not accounted for in the staff bio-data.
- (xvi) 2,066 (0.9%) officers out of 231,830 were not paid salaries in the 2023/2024 FY. The highest number of officers not paid were drawn from public universities and a total of KSh. 2,489,658,249.34 was owed to the staff as of 30th June 2024, with staff of public universities having the highest outstanding amounts at KSh. 2,084,688,096.15 (84%). Institutions gave diverse reasons for failure to pay the respective officers. These included: financial constraints with 1,494 (72%), affected officers facing disciplinary action with 372 (18%).
- (xvii) Out of the 12,346-teaching staff, 6,914 (56%) were employed by the TVET Boards but paid by the State Department for TVET. There were also 5,428 (44%) temporary tutors employed by the Boards of Management and paid by the Boards. There were 4 TVET tutors who were still under Teachers Service Commission payroll.
- (xviii) The number of TVET tutors had increased from 11,181 in 2021 to 12,346 in 2024. This was an increase of 1,165 (10.4%) while the total student enrolment was 372,220 against 12,346 tutors, translating to a tutor student ratio 1:30. 173 (34%) TVET institutions operated at the recommended ratio of 70:30 Technical to non-technical staff, while 335 (66%) did not comply with the ratio.
- (xix) A total of 180 (33.6%) institutions reported having 1,015 (0.4%) officers on secondment. The secondment duration of 860 (84.7%) officers was within the stipulated secondment period of Six (6) years, while for 81 (8%) officers, the duration exceeded the prescribed period.
- (xx) 715 (70.4%) seconded staff were paid by the receiving institutions, while 224 (22.1%) were paid by the sending institutions. 432 (42.6%) of all the secondments were approved by the Public Service Commission. 35 officers from 27 (8%) institutions had been on secondment beyond the six years. No action was taken on 13 (37%) of the non-compliant officers, while 8 (23%) were granted further extensions contrary to the PSC Act 2017 and PSC regulations.
- (xxi) In the 2022/2023 FY, 114 officers from 41 institutions were reported to have been on secondment beyond six years. Various actions were taken against 38 officers from 27 institutions. No action was however taken against the rest of the 76 officers.

2.4 Service Delivery Improvement

Regarding general service delivery improvement, findings revealed that:

- (i) 438 (86.2%) institutions reported to have developed service charters while 70 (13.8%) had not.
- (ii) 357 (70.3%) institutions had customized their websites to be responsive to Persons with Disabilities while 151(29.7%) had not.
- (iii) 421 (78.5%) institutions had customized 17,612 facilities and services to be responsive to Persons with Disabilities, out of which 9,525 (54.1%) were at the headquarters offices and 8,087 (45.9%) in the field offices.
- (iv) 283 (55.7%) organizations had established digitalization committees and 218 (42.9%) organizations had operationalized the committees by holding meetings.
- (v) 174 (34.3%) organizations had carried out a baseline survey to determine organizational digitalization levels. The organization with the highest digitalization level was the Retirements Benefit Authority, with 92%.
- (vi) 393 (77%) of the evaluated institutions had documented 3,321 business processes, of which 345 (68%) and 258 (51%) had automated and migrated their automated business processes to an e-platform, respectively. Of the 3,321 documented services reported, 2,850 (85.8%) were fully documented, 361 (10.9%) were partially documented,

and 110 (3.3%) were not documented. Of the automated services, 1,990 (59.9%) were fully automated, 1,000 (30.1%) were partially automated, and 331 (10%) were not automated.

- (vii) Regarding migration of services to e-platform, 1,771 (53.3%) were fully available, 416 (12.5%) were partially available and 1,134 (34.1%) were not available.
- (viii) The most prevalent mode of payment for the services was mobile money and banking at 1,138 (34.3%). The mode of payment for 1,122 (33.8%) services was however not indicated.
- (ix) 106 (20.87%) institutions had developed social media policy guidelines, while 402 (79.13%) had not.
- (x) 251 (49.4%) institutions had customer service registers, an increase of 46 from the 205 reported in the 2022/23 FY.
- (xi) 315 (62.0%) Institutions received 27,525 complaints. The number of institutions and complaints increased by 17 from 298 and 10,008 from 17,517 reported in the 2022/23 FY, respectively.
- (xii) The most preferred mode of presenting complaints to the institutions was email (30.6%), followed by social media (27.9%) and institutional digital platforms (18.8%).
- (xiii) 13,160 (47.8%) out of the 27,525 complaints were resolved while 1,529 (5.6%) were pending.
- (xiv) 24,773 (90%) complaints were resolved within 90 days while 550 (2.0%) were resolved beyond the stipulated timeline.
- (xv) The leading cause of complaints was lack of or delay in service delivery at 50.9%, followed by unsatisfactory services at 37.3% and availing of information at 3.7%.
- (xvi) 198 (38.9%) institutions received 3,950 compliments from their clients. Out of the 3,950 compliments received, 2,302 (58.3%) were directed to institutions, 1,190 (30.1%) to individuals and 429 (10.9%) to both institutions and individuals.
- (xvii) 36 (7.1%) institutions had operationalized their services at 57 Huduma centres, and 2,873 officers were deployed and 8.3% of the institutions had service desks in all the 57 Huduma centres. These were the National Police Service, National Registration Bureau; and Directorate of Criminal Investigations (DCI).
- (xviii) Pension department had deployed 46 officers in 37 Huduma centres across the Country to handle pension matters while HELB had operational desks in 28 (49.1%) out of the 57 Huduma centres with 38 officers providing HELB-related support services.
- (xix) 65 (12.9%) institutions registered 505 patents during the 2023/2024 FY, of which 97 (19.2%) were on design, 243 (48.1%) were on utility, and 12 (2.4%) were on plant. KIPRI reported that 519 products were patented, out of which 363 (69.9%) were plant, 93 (17.9%) were design, and 63 (12.1%) were utility. Out of the registered patents, 493 (95%) were from private institutions, while 25(5%) were from public institutions.
- (xx) 20 (3.9%) institutions copyrighted 145 products, out of which 81 (55.8%) were artistic works, 36 (24.8%) literacy works and 11 (7.6%) audio-visual works. KECOBO reported that 11,811 items were copyrighted, out of which 4,545 (38%) were sound recordings, 3,868 (33%) audiovisual works, 2,205 (19%) literary works and 1,193 (10%) artistic works.
- (xxi) 192 (37.8%) institutions reported to have set up lactation stations while 316 (62.2%) institutions had not. Of the 192 institutions reported to have set up lactation stations, 109 (56.8%) had fully equipped lactating stations which were installed with all the essential facilities. The number of institutions that had set up lactation stations increased by 65 from the 127 reported in the 2022/23 FY.

2.5 High Standards of Professional Ethics in the Public Service

Regarding high standards of professional ethics, findings revealed that:

- (i) 415 institutions reported to have 22,961 professionals out of whom 19,404 (84.5%) were registered while 1124 (4.9%) were not. The registration status for 2,433 (10.6%) professionals was not indicated. 10,114 (44%) of the registered professionals had current practising licenses while 12,847 (56%) did not. 10,114 (44%) members of diverse professional bodies were practicing while 1,425 (6.2%) were non-practising.
- (ii) Of the 22,961 reported professionals, 10,700 (46.6%) attended CPD training while 12,261 (53.4%) did not. The highest number of officers who underwent CPD training were sponsored by the respective institutions with 6,955 (65.0%) followed by combined institution and self-sponsorship with 1,907 (17.8%) and self-sponsorship with 1,838 (17.2%).
- (iii) 12,261(53.4%) of the 22,961 professionals in the public service did not undergo any CPD training. 7032(30.6%) of the registered professionals were drawn from the health sector out of whom 6077 (86.5%) did not undergo CPD training.
- (iv) 224 (1.0%) of the 22,961 public service professionals were reported to have been disciplined for professional misconduct.
- (v) 358 (70.5%) institutions reported having authenticated academic and professional certificates for 168,667 officers. Out of a total of the 168,667 officers, 859 (0.5%) were found with fake academic certificates, certificates for 24,559 (14.6%) officers were not authenticated, while the status of authentication for 143,249 (84.9%) officers were not indicated. Out of 168,667 officers, 160 (0.1%) were found with fake professional certificates, 7,474 (4.4%).
- (vi) Out of 1,019 officers found with fake certificates, action was taken on 744 (73%) officers. 79 (7.8%) officers were still undergoing investigation and no action was taken on 15 (1.5%).

2.6 Good Governance, Transparency and Accountability

Regarding good governance, transparency, and accountability, findings revealed that:

- (i) 221 (67%) of 330 reporting institutions had officers on acting appointment from which 2,614 (1.2%) officers held acting positions, out of whom 847 (32%) acted within the 6 months prescribed in law, while 1,738 (66%) had acted beyond the six months. The acting period for 29 officers was not specified.
- (ii) 152 (28.4%) institutions indicated that they had officers assigned to perform higher duties and paid special duty allowances, while 384 (71.6%) did not. 1,508 (0.7%) officers were appointed to perform higher duties, of whom 913 (60.5%) exceeded the six-month period allowed by law.
- (iii) Out of the 536 institutions evaluated, 484 (90.3%) institutions were managed by Commissions, Boards, Committees or Councils. However, only 309 (63.8%) institutions had fully constituted Boards/Council.
- (iv) Out of the 206 TVET institutions, only 58 (28%) institutions had capitation and scholarship committees appointed. 43 (74%) of the 58 of the scholarship and capitation committees held meetings.
- (v) 41 (8.1%) institutions had customized the Code of Conduct and Ethics for persons participating in public procurement, while 467 (91.9%) had not.
- (vi) 113 (22.2%) institutions had been registered with the Office of the Data Protection Commissioner. However, only one TVET institution, i.e. Meru National Polytechnic, had registered as a data processor/controller.
- (vii) 28 (5.5%) institutions had reported cases of corruption affecting 337 (0.2%) public officers out of which 206 (61.1%) were completed, 2 (0.6%) were discontinued, 126 (37.4%) were still under investigation.

- (viii) The total amount of money lost from corruption-related cases was 643.6 M out of which Kenyatta National Hospital (KNH) had the highest value of assets lost at 517.9 M (80.5%).
- (ix) 213 (41.9%) institutions were involved in civil proceedings. The number of institutions increased by 7 from the 206 evaluated in the 2022/2023 FY. 6,063 suits were filed against public institutions. The number of suits filed increased by 1,878 (44.9%) from the 4,185 reported in the 2022/23 FY.
- (x) Awards totalling KSh.43.8 B were made against public institutions for 559 cases while awards totalling KSh.3.8 B were made in favour of public institutions on 457 cases.
- (xi) 73 (14.4%) institutions reported to have officers who received 978 gifts. 54 (10.6%) institutions had gift registers in place, and 532 (93.2%) officers received 888 (90.8%) gifts valued at KSh. 4,997,040. Most officers were gifted Branded Promotional Materials with 383 (39.2%), followed by Assorted Branded Items with 261 (26.7%), Cash and Gift vouchers with 74 (7.6%) and Apparel with 66 (6.7%).
- (xii) Prohibited gifts such as cash/gift vouchers and alcohol were received by 87 officers and declared in 9 and 7 institutions, respectively. 74 officers received cash/gift vouchers, while 13 officers received alcohol.
- (xiii) 69 (13.6%) institutions gave out 1,226 gifts for different purposes, including courtesy, custom, hospitality, and protocol. Though the number of institutions remained the same, gifts increased by 515 from the 711 given out in the 2022/23 FY.
- (xiv) 19 institutions gave out gift that were valued between KSh. 21,000 to KSh. 100,000. While 7 institutions gave out gifts whose value was above KSh. 100,000.
- (xv) 161 conflict of interest cases were reported from 34 (6.7%) institutions. The highest number of conflict-of-interest cases involved individual public officers, with 96 (59.6%) cases, followed by family and friends, with 18 (11.2%) and 8 (5.0%) cases, respectively.
- (xvi) 138 (27.2%) organizations prepared annual reports, a decline of 57 from the 195 institutions in the 2022/2023 FY.
- (xvii) Of the 536 evaluated institutions, 408 (76.1%) institutions appointed 8,754 new officers in the 2023/2024 FY. 4,734 (54.1%) of the newly appointed officers filed the initial declarations within the statutory timeline of 30 days, while 4,020 (45.9%) did not comply.
- (xviii) 218,796 (98.7%) complied with every two-year declaration by 31st December 2023. Further, 282 (95.9%) institutions submitted the every-two-year DIALs returns to the Public Service Commission while 38 universities submitted to the Commission for University Education.
- (xix) 8,411 officers exited the service during the evaluation period out of whom 2,510 (29.8%) filed final declarations, while 5,901 (70.2%) officers who exited from 130 (40.8%) institutions did not comply.

2.7 Performance Management

Regarding performance management, findings revealed that:

- (i) 338 (66.5%) institutions developed or reviewed their Strategic Plans and aligned them to the 5th generation Strategic Plan, 2023-2027. 381 (75%) institutions had complied with the recommendation in the 2022/23 values compliance report on the alignment of the Strategic Plans to the Bottom-up Economic Transformation Agenda (BETA) and the fourth Medium Term Plan develop or review the Plans by 30th June, 2024. The most utilized mode for dissemination of the strategic plans was through staff meetings (88) followed by email (84) and publications (52). Others were launch ceremonies (41), websites (39), webinars (20), WhatsApp (13), Twitter (1) and through Flyers (1).
- (ii) 274 (53.9%) institutions had constituted Performance Contracting Committees (PCCs). Further, 260 (51.2%)

institutions signed performance contracts with the government in the 2023/24FY. 444 (87.4%) institutions had their staff set performance targets, although only 260 (51.2%) had signed performance contracts with the government. Out of the 216,412 officers, 124,370 (57.5%) set performance targets, while 92,042 (42.5%) did not. This implied that half of public officers were not being held accountable for performance and results.

- (iii) In the 2022/23 FY, 407 (81.7%) Institutions implemented performance contracts and were evaluated, while 91(18.3%) did not. The number of institutions that implemented and were evaluated increased by 22 from the 385 reported in the 2021/22 FY. The number of institutions that failed to implement the PC declined by 37 from the 128 reported in the 2021/22 FY.
- (iv) Out of the 216,412 officers, 124,370 (57.5%) set performance targets out of whom 105,788 (85.1%) were appraised while 18,582 (14.9%) were not. This was an improvement from the 2022/23 FY where 43.1% were appraised against those who set targets.
- (v) Out of 444 institutions that had set performance targets, 128 (25.2%) had their EPMC meet to make recommendations on individual performance scores, rewards or sanctions. Further, out of 105,788 officers appraised, 10,719 (10%) were rewarded (20.9%), sanctioned (4.9%) or placed on performance improvement plans (2.3%).
- (vi) The highest percentage of officers who set targets was 68% in 2020/2021, followed by 2021/2022 at 58.8% and 2018/2019 at 58%. On average, more than half of the officers set targets in the six years of evaluation.
- (vii) 198 (36.9%) institutions had developed comprehensive Human Resource Management and Development Plans, while a total of 313 (61.6%) of 508 institutions reported to have identified skills and competencies gaps totalling 5,966.
- (viii) 215 (42.3%) out of the 508 institutions evaluated, implemented 10 employee wellness programmes. 439,775 public officers (including repeat trainees) benefited from multiple wellness programmes out of whom 224,363 (51.0%) were male, 215,412 (49.0%) were female and 1,044 (0.2%) were PWDs. Non-communicable diseases awareness programmes benefited the highest number of participants with 330,615 (75.1%), mental health management and general sensitization programmes with 19,812 (4.5%) and 19,150 (4.3%) respectively. Drug and substance abuse awareness and medical wellness programmes had 18,884 (4.2%) and 17,184 (3.9%) participants respectively.
- (ix) Of the 536 evaluated institutions, 391 (72.9%) institutions appointed a total of 8,754 new officers in the 2023/2024 FY. 3,274 (37.4%) of the appointed officers were inducted within the 3 months of joining the institutions while 5,480 (62.6%) were not inducted or were inducted beyond the stipulated 3 months induction period. Of the 2,613 officers appointed in MDAs, only 173 (6.6%) were inducted within the 3 months stipulated period.
- (x) 298 (55.4%) out of the 536 institutions evaluated indicated that they had undertaken TNA out of whom 53 (17.8%) had followed the prescribed policy process.
- (xi) 89,610 (38.7%) officers drawn from 370 (69%) institutions benefitted from group trainings and the institutions that had the highest number of officers who benefitted from group trainings were Ministry of Defence (19.1%), Kenyatta University (5.6%), The University of Nairobi (4.3%), State Department for Internal Security and National Administration (3.4%) and Kenyatta National Hospital (2.3%) of the total beneficiaries.
- (xii) 62,303 (26.9%) officers drawn from 355 (66.0%) institutions were trained out of whom 32,568 (52.3%) were trained attended at least 5 days training. 99.8% of the courses had been duly approved by the relevant authorities while 40 (0.1%) were not approved. Of the 62,303 public

officers sponsored for training, 59,048 (94.8%) completed, 3,127 (5%) were ongoing, 113 (0.2%) were deferred while 15 training courses were abandoned. Senior Management Course (SMC) attracted the highest number of trainees with 3,680 (21.6%), followed by Supervisory Skills Development Course with 1,787 (10.5%) and Strategic Leadership Development Programme with 1,693 (9.9%).

- (xiii) 83 (15.4%) institutions conducted Training Impact Assessment (TIA) while 455 (84.6%) did not.
- (xiv) 425 (79.3%) institutions reported having approved leave to officers while 111 (20.7%) did not. 76,030 (31.6%) officers utilized all their leave days while 74,564 (31%) officers carried forward up to 15 days of their leave days. 47,439 (19.7%) took less than 15 days of their leave days, while 39,764 (16.5%) did not take any leave days and 2,892 (1.2%) officers commuted their leave days. A total of 90,095 (37.4%) of the officers did not comply with the policy on utilization of leave.
- (xv) 123 (23.7%) institutions granted leave of absence to 317 public officers out of whom 7 (2.2%) officers exceeded the leave period. 124 (23.5%) institutions granted unpaid leave to 280 officers out of whom 146 (52.1%) officers exceeded the leave period.
- (xvi) Out of the 40 public universities evaluated, 15 (37.5%) granted 63 officers sabbatical leave out of which 42 (66.7%) resumed within the 12 months stipulated period while 20 (31.7%) did not comply.
- (xvii) 386 (72%) institutions granted other types of leave to 46,389 (20%) officers as follows: 2,009 (0.9%) officers were granted maternity leave, 2,092 (0.9%) officers were granted paternity leave, 792 (0.3%) officers were granted compassionate leave, 9 (0.004%) were granted Special Leave for Sportspersons, 13,292 (5.7%) officers were granted sick leave, 1,010 (12%) officers were granted terminal leave, 6 officers from State Corporations and SAGAs were granted child adoption leave, 27,026 (11.7%) officers were granted emergency leave, 37 (0.02%) officers were granted study leave and 87 (0.04%) officers were granted examination leave.
- (xviii) 210 (39.2%) out of the 536 evaluated institutions reported having undertaken 4,091 (1.8%) disciplinary cases. The highest nature of misconduct was due to negligence of duty at 1,243 (30.4%) followed by absence from duty without official permission at 851 (20.8%). Others were falsification of records at 483 (11.8%), ethical breaches at 325 (7.9%), corruption and fraud at 265 (6.5%), misuse of organizational assets and resources at 135 (3.3%) and theft by servant at 133 (3.3%). The sanctions with the highest frequency were issuance of warning or caution at 1,673 (40.9%) followed by summary dismissal at 659 (16.1%), surcharges and recovery of costs at 185 (4.5%), salary stoppage at 93 (2.3%), reprimand at 60 (1.5%) and demotion in rank at 16 (0.4%).
- (xix) Out of the 4,091 disciplinary cases reported, 1,109 (27.1%) cases were concluded within six months, 271 (6.6%) cases had taken beyond six months, 42 (1.03%) were on-going, 2,372 (58%) had no date of completion provided while 297 (7.3%) had an error in the dates of completion provided.
- (xx) 8,411 (3.6%) officers out of 231,830 exited the service out of whom 2,957 (35.2%) were female, 5,454 (64.8%) were male and 121 (1.4%) were PWDs.
- (xxi) 174 (54.5%) out of 319 institutions reported to have conducted exit interviews. 3,705 (44%) out of the 8,411 officers who exited were interviewed while 133 (41.7%) institutions did not conduct exit interviews for 4,310 (51.2%) officers.
- (xxii) 2,048 (96.2%) officers who exited the service from Ministries and State Departments were eligible for pension payments. 472 (23.0%) out of 2,048 officers who were eligible for payment of pension were reported to have been paid their pension benefits, 1,185 (57.9%) had not been paid while the payment status for 611 (29.8% exiting officers was not indicated. The total allocation for pension claims for 2023/2024 FY was KSh. 140, 744, 299, 907,

and the total pension claims processed was KSh. 118,552,668,481. The Department received 17,934 claims from MDAs for processing out of which 2,362 (13.2%) claims were referred back to MDAs for clarification while 15,572 (86.8%) were issued with pension claim numbers.

2.8 Equitable Allocation of Opportunities and Resources

Regarding Equitable Allocation of Opportunities and Resources, findings revealed that:

- (i) Gender representation in the public service was 139,529 (60.2%) male and 92,301 (39.81%) female. 80 (14.9%) organizations had not met the constitutional two-thirds gender principle.
- (ii) The representation of PWDs in the public service was at 4,068 (1.8%) meaning the 5% constitutional threshold had not been attained. There was however an improvement of 0.3%, from the 1.5% representation reported during the 2022/2023 FY.
- (iii) TVET institutes had a total of 17,435 employees of whom 10,182 (58.4%) were male and 7,253 (41.6%) female. 41 (20%) of the TVETs had not met the two-thirds gender requirement.
- (iv) 228 (1.3%) of 17,435 employees were PWDs out of which 17 (8.3%) had met the 5% PWD threshold.
- (v) Gender representation across job levels met the two-thirds gender representation principle except for policy level, where the gender distribution was male 299 (74.7%) and female 101 (25.2%). Further, PWD representation did not meet the 5% threshold with gross underrepresentation 4 (1%) at the Policy level.
- (vi) 43 ethnic communities were represented in the service, out of which 39 (86.7%) had normal representation while the TVET staff were drawn from 34 (75.6%) ethnic communities.
- (vii) 202 (41.7%) institutions did not meet the minimum gender requirements in appointment of Commissions, Board, Committee, Council members. 1,085 (28.5%) of 3,806 members of Commissions, Boards and Councils were aged between 46 - 55 years.
- (viii) 391 (72.9%) institutions appointed 8,447 (3.6%) new officers, out of whom 3,633 (43%) were female, 4,814 (57%) male while 112 (1.3%) were PWDs. The two-thirds gender requirement was met in the appointments. The appointments were drawn from 40 (88.9%) ethnic groups.
- (ix) 1,515 officers were recruited non-competitively by 51 (10%) institutions, out of whom 895 (59.1%) were male and 620 (40.9%) were female. 10 (0.7%) of the officers appointed non-competitively were PWDs. The officers appointed non-competitively were drawn from 32 (71.1%) ethnic groups.
- (x) 62,303 (26.9%) officers drawn from 355 (66.0%) institutions were trained, out of whom 34,715 (55.7%) were male, 27,588 (44.3%) were female, 771 (1.2%) were PWDs. The number of PWDs beneficiaries declined by 29.9% from the 1,100 trained in the 2022/23 FY. The officers who were trained were drawn from 41 ethnic communities.
- (xi) 306 (57%) institutions promoted 26,953 (11.6%) officers out of whom 11,322 (42%) were female, 15,631 (58%) were male and 429 (1.6%) were PWDs. The officers promoted were drawn from 40 ethnic communities.
- (xii) The Public Service Commission recruited 8,012 interns of which 3,704 (46.2%) were female and 4,184 (52.2%) male. The number increased by 4,110 from the 3,902 recruited in the 2022/23 FY. 124 PWDs (1.5%) benefited from the internship programme and the number of PWD interns increased by 21 from the 103 (2.6%) recruited in the 2022/23 FY. However, the 5% threshold was not met. The interns recruited were drawn from 33 (73%) ethnic communities out of which 29 had normal representation.
- (xiii) 174 institutions recruited a total of 5,288 interns outside the PSIP out of whom 2,842 (53.7%) were male, 2,442 (46.2%) were female, and 75 (1.4%) were PWDs. The interns were drawn from 35 (77.8%) ethnic communities.

- (xiv) 395 (77.8%) institutions awarded tenders to special groups, while 113 (22.2%) did not. The number of organizations that did not award tenders to special groups increased by 23 (4.4%) compared to the 2022/2023 FY.
- (xv) The total procurement budget was KSh. 993.5 B, 30% of which was KSh. 298.1 B. However, the total procurement budget awarded to special groups under AGPO was KSh.77.2 B (20%), a shortfall of KSh. 220.9 B (10%). None of the 395 complied with the 30% allocation of procurement budget to specialized groups under the AGPO policy.
- (xvi) 63,006 individuals benefited from the total KSh.77.2 B (26%) AGPO opportunities, 60,652 of whom were categorized under Women, Youth, and PWD groups. KSh.77.2 B was allocated to the special groups, of which 36,353 (57.7%) women were allocated KSh. 37.3 B (48%), followed by 18,729 (29.7%) youth who received KSh. 25.2 B (33%) and 5,570 (8.8%) PWDs who received KSh. 9.4 B (12%).
- (xvii) A total of 122 scholarships were distributed by the State Department of Public Service to officers in 17 (3.3%) institutions out of which 66 (54%) were awarded to male officers and 56 (46%) were awarded to female officers. Only 13 (28.9%) ethnic communities benefitted from the scholarships.
- (xviii) KSh. 14,631,003,049 was disbursed to 917,743 students, out of whom 457,256 (49.8%) were female and 460,487 (50.2%) were male. KSh. 7,286,239,518.4 (49.8%) of the total amount disbursed went to the female students, while KSh. 7,344,763,530.6 (50.2%) went to male students.
- (xix) 26,335 students received bursaries amounting to KSh. 260.04 M. 13,499 (51.2%) beneficiaries were female who received KSh. 131.88 M (50.7%) and 11,472 (48.8%) were male who received KSh. 117.08 M (49.3%). There were 1,141 (4.3%) PWD beneficiaries who received 12.13 M (4.7%). The bursary beneficiaries were drawn from 34 (75.6%) ethnic communities.
- (xx) Nairobi county had the highest number of bursary beneficiaries with 3,363 (12.7%) followed by Busia with 2,211 (8.4%) and Migori with 1,103 (4.2%). The least number of beneficiaries were from Siaya and Narok with 1 and 2 beneficiaries respectively.
- (xxi) Impact Evaluation for bursary award programmes had not been undertaken.
- (xxii) A total of KSh. 182,700,000 was disbursed by NGAAP to 19,580 students in secondary schools across the 33 (70.2%) counties. There were no student beneficiaries from Elgeyo Marakwet, Lamu, Marsabit, Narok, Turkana, Wajir and West Pokot.
- (xxiii) A total of KSh. 2,533, 960,000 was disbursed through Elimu Scholarship Programme to 38000 (0.9%) of the total enrolled student population in 47 counties. Of the beneficiaries 19,688(51.8%) were female and 18,332(48.2%) were male. The highest number of beneficiaries were from Turkana county with 22.7% having benefitted from KSh. 575,208,525. It was followed by Nairobi at 10.4% with KSh. 262,986,616 and Garissa 9.8% with KSh. 247,395,409 of the total amounts awarded.
- (xxiv) 14,213 student beneficiaries from 3,753 schools received presidential bursary totaling KSh. 197.1 M out of whom 7,667 (53.9%) were female while 6,546 (46.1%) were male who received KSh. 105.3 M (53.4%) and KSh. 91.8 M (46.6%) respectively. Kakamega county had the highest number of student beneficiaries with 1,143 (8%) followed by Nairobi with 569 (4%) and Homa Bay 558 (3.9%). However, Isiolo county did not benefit from the presidential bursary fund.
- (xxv) The total beneficiaries on scholarships by the State Department for Higher Education across all programmes was 394 students out of whom 144 were female (36.5%) and 250 were male (63.5%). None of the beneficiaries was PWD. 46 counties benefited from the scholarships with Nairobi taking the largest number with 29 (7.4%) followed by Mandera with 23 (5.8%) and Kiambu with 20 (5.1%). West Pokot County did not benefit from the scholarships awarded by the State Department.
- (xxvi) KSh. 32,888,495,682 was disbursed to 605,436 loan beneficiaries during the evaluation period by HELB out of whom 238,665 (39%) were female, 366,808 (61%) were male, while 326 (0.1%) were PWDs. HELB had operational desks in 28 (50%) out of the 56 Huduma centres with 38 officers providing HELB-related support services.
- (xxvii) 50,509 TVET students were awarded scholarships amounting to KSh. 1,356,917,953.4. 18,643 (36.9%) students who were awarded scholarships worth KSh. 546,182,917.40 were female while 21,156 (41.9%) who received scholarships worth KSh. 656,243,995.39 were male and 54 (0.1%) PWD students received scholarships amounting to KSh. 2,036,162.7. The scholarship beneficiaries were drawn from 128 (62.1%) TVETs and 32 (71.1%) ethnic communities.
- (xxviii) A total of 41,002 groups were registered for social empowerment programmes. The groups had total membership of 681,052 of whom 27,832 (4%) were members of men groups, 333,739 (49%) were members of mixed groups, 125,256 (18.4%) belonged to women groups, 30,187 (4.4%) belonged to youth groups, 3,896 (0.6%) belonged to PWD groups while 160,142 (23.5%) belonged to CBOs.
- (xxix) Under the Cash Transfer for Orphans and Vulnerable Children programme, 1,295,755 new orphans and 486,234 guardians were registered. 1,319,580 new members were registered under the Older Persons Cash Transfer programme, of whom 517,592 (39.2%) were male while 801,988 (60.8%) were female. Under the Persons with Severe Disabilities Cash Transfer programme, 72,307 new persons with severe disabilities were registered, of whom 38,823 (53.7%) were male, while 33,484 (46.3%) were female.
- (xxx) 441,760 households with 1,172,768 orphans and vulnerable children received support amounting to KSh. 6.37 B. Majority of the households were female headed with 365,817 (82.8%) compared to the 75,943 (17.2%) male headed households. The highest number of registered beneficiaries were from Turkana County 24,848 (5.6%) followed by Kakamega with 19,470 (4.4%) and Mandera with 17,970 (4%). The least beneficiaries were from Lamu county with 1,867 (0.4%) followed by Taita Taveta with 3,350 (0.8%) and Laikipia with 3,493 (0.7%).
- (xxxi) 61,174 (13.8%) households received support amounting to KSh. 1,015,190,000 under the Persons with Severe Disabilities Cash Transfer Program. Of this, 27,628 (45.2%) households were female headed while 33,546 (54.8%) were male headed. The highest number of beneficiaries under the Persons with Severe Disabilities Cash Transfer Programme were from Mandera county with 3,712 (6%) followed by Migori with 2,676 (4.4%) and Nairobi with 2,669 (4.3%). The least number of beneficiaries were from Isiolo county with 304 (0.5%) followed by Lamu with 311 (0.5%) and Tana River with 515 (0.8%).
- (xxxii) 1,236,985 beneficiaries received support amounting to KSh. 18,697,432,000 under the Older Persons Cash Transfer Programme. Majority of the beneficiaries were female at 754,741 (61%) and 482,244 (39%) were male. The highest number of beneficiaries were from Murang'a county with 65,319 (5.2%) followed by Kiambu with 55,758 (4.5%) and Kitui with 54,260 (4.3%). The least beneficiaries were from Lamu 3,680 (0.3%) followed by Isiolo 5,005 (0.4%) and Tana River 6,948 (0.6%).
- (xxxiii) A total of 525 new households were registered for hunger safety net programme from which 133,476 beneficiaries received stipends worth KSh. 4.32B, with each household receiving KSh. 2,700 per month. The highest

- number of beneficiaries and amounts disbursed were from Turkana County with 39,860 (29.9%) followed by Mandera with 22,207 (16.6%) and Marsabit with 20,387 (15.2%). The least beneficiaries and amounts disbursed were from Isiolo with 6,985 (5.2%) followed by Tana River with 7,361 (5.5%) and Samburu with 8,295 (6.2%).
- (xxxiv) 21,364 youths benefited from the KYEOP programme with a total of KSh. 509,680,000 being awarded as grants out of whom 10,971 (51%) females benefitted from KSh. 262,080,000 while 10,393 (49%) male benefitted from KSh. 247,600,000 and 388 (1.8%) PWDs benefitted from KSh. 10,160,000. 17 (36.1%) counties benefitted from the programme out of which Nairobi was the highest beneficiary with KSh. 73,340,000 (14.4%), followed by Kakamega with KSh. 46,540,000 (9.1%) and Kiambu with KSh. 41,140,000 (8.1%). 22 (48.9%) ethnic communities benefitted from the programme.
- (xxxv) 652 youths benefited from the Empowering Novel Agribusiness Led Employment (ENABLE) Youth programme out of whom 193 (29.6%) were female, 459 (70.4%) were male, while only 1 (0.15%) was a PWD. Out of the total KSh. 2,738,400 disbursed, KSh. 810,600 (29.6%) and KSh. 1,927,800 (70.4%) were disbursed to the female and male youths respectively. 45 counties benefitted from the ENABLE programme with Nyeri county receiving the highest amount at KSh. 277,200 (10.1%) followed by Nakuru at KSh. 189,000 (6.9%) and Narok at KSh. 176,400 (6.4%). The two counties that did not benefit were Tana River and Lamu. 20 (44%) ethnic communities benefitted from the stipend.
- (xxxvi) A total of 4,098 groups with 61,730 members benefited from UWEZO programme, of which 3,101 (75.7%) were women groups, 867 (21.2%) were youth groups and 105 (2.6%) were PWD groups. A total of KSh. 418,472,000 was disbursed to the groups as loans, out of which KSh. 329,115,000 (78.6%) was disbursed to women groups, KSh. 76,812,000 (18.4%) to youth groups and KSh. 10,145,000 (2.4%) to PWD groups. KSh. 2,400,000 (0.6%) was however disbursed to unidentified groups. The programme beneficiaries were drawn from 36 (76.6%) counties and Nakuru County had the highest disbursement with KSh. 39,230,000 (9.4%), followed by Meru with KSh. 34,880,000 (8.3%) and Murang'a with KSh. 24,025,000 (5.7%).
- (xxxvii) KSh.355.15 M was disbursed by Youth Enterprise Development Fund (YEDF) out of which 221.8 M (62.4%) and 133.4 M (37.6%) was disbursed to youth groups and individual youths respectively. 152 individual youths benefited out of whom 62 (40.8%) were female and received KSh. 82.4 M (61.8%) while 90 (59.2%) were male who received KSh. 50.9M (38.2%). Individual youth beneficiaries were drawn from 34 (72.3%) counties with Nairobi having received the highest disbursement with KSh. 34.1 M (25.5%). It was followed by Embu with KSh. 14.1 M (10.6%) and Nyeri with KSh. 13.4 M (10.1%). Impact evaluation on youth empowerment programmes has never been undertaken since the establishment of the Fund in 2006.
- (xxxviii) 6,107 individuals and 4 households were supported by NGAAF financially with KSh. 33.6 M and in-kind (in form of blankets, wheelchairs, umbrellas, foodstuffs).
- (xxxix) Vulnerable persons and marginalized groups were the highest beneficiaries 3,162 (51.7%) of NGAAF followed by needy elderly persons with 659 (10.8%) and needy youth with 112 (1.8%). Others were needy children with 37 (0.6%), parents of children with severe disabilities with 33 (0.5%), persons with disability with 13 (0.2%) and various households with 4 (0.06%).
- (xl) Counties that received the highest NGAAF financial support were Nakuru with KSh. 21.1 M (62.8%) followed by Lamu with KSh. 5.9M (17.6%) and Embu with KSh. 5.5 M (16.4%). The counties that received the highest support in kind were Trans Nzoia and Siaya with 2,216 (55%) and 1,211 (30%) respectively.

- (xli) Only 14 (29.7%) counties benefitted from NGAAF support while 17 (37.8%) ethnic communities benefitted.
- (xlii) A total of KSh. 363,637,031.80 was disbursed under the Equalization Fund.
- (xliii) COB reported that it did not receive any report from the National Treasury on disbursement of equalization funds to the implementing agencies in the 2023/2024 FY.

2.9 Public Participation in Policy Making Process

Regarding Public participation in policy making process, findings revealed that:

- (i) 34 (7%) of the 508 institutions reported to have customized the Public Service Commission guidelines on public participation despite being recommended in the 2022/2023 Values and Principles Report.
- (ii) 237 (46.7%) of the institutions evaluated developed/reviewed 366 policies or legislations during the evaluation period. 116 (48.9%) out of the 237 institutions which developed or reviewed policies subjected the same to public participation.
- (iii) 220 (60.1%) out of the 366 developed or reviewed policies were subjected to validation after public participation. 185 (84.1%) out of the 220 policies subjected to stakeholder validation had been finalised. However, 6 (4.5 %) of the policies subjected to validation had been challenged in court.
- (iv) 10 (2.7%) of the policies subjected to public participation had been transcribed into braille while 324 (88.5%) were not. 49 (20.6%) of the 237 institutions which conducted public participation and stakeholder validation engaged the services of 121 sign language interpreters.
- (v) 8 (1.6%) institutions indicated that they had undertaken impact evaluation on the policies implemented as recommended in 2022/2023 FY while 500 (98.4%) had not.

2.10 Efficiency, Effectiveness and Economic Use of Resources and Sustainable Development

Regarding Efficiency, effectiveness and economic use of resources and sustainable development, findings revealed that:

- (i) 6 (85.7%) out of 7 institutions designated by the National Treasury as receivers of revenue collected and remitted revenue. These were: State Department for Immigration and Citizen Services, Kenya Agricultural & Livestock Research Organization (KARLO), The State Law Office, Ministry of Defence, State Department for Lands and Physical Planning, and State Department for Internal Security and National Administration. The Ethics and Anti-Corruption Commission did not collect any revenue.
- (ii) The State Department for Immigration and Citizen Services collected the highest amount of revenue with 17.4 B (40.5%) while the State Department for Immigration and Citizen Services remitted the highest amount with 17.4B (48.5%).
- (iii) Five State Corporations and SAGAs remitted a total of KSh. 19,385.6 B to The National Treasury as dividends. These were the Kenya Airports Authority (KAA), Kenya Maritime Authority, Kenya Pipeline Company (KPC), Kenya Ports Authority (KPA) and National Housing Corporation.
- (iv) The budget for 2023/2024 FY was 4.3 T and the actual revenue realized was KSh. 3.8 T, giving a deficit of KSh. 469.3 B. The national government entities budgeted for KSh. 3.9 T and were allocated KSh. 3.4 T with a deficit of KSh. 437 B while the county government-equitable share was KSh. 385.4 B, out of which KSh. 354.6 B was disbursed, giving a deficit of KSh. 30.8 B.
- (v) 286 (56.3%) institutions implemented 2,046 programmes with 2,501 sub-programmes. Of the 2,501 sub-programmes 1,606 (64.2%) were fully implemented, 91 (3.6%) were not implemented while 701 (28%) sub-programmes were partially implemented. The implementation status for 103 (4.1%) sub-programmes was however not indicated.

- (vi) Out of the 508 evaluated institutions, 214 (42.1%) undertook a total of 3,428 development projects at an estimated cost of KSh. 11,525,347.88. 755 (22.0%) projects were complete, 2,403 (70.1%) were ongoing, 120 (3.5%) stalled, 72 (2.1%) were yet to start, while 8 (0.2%) were terminated and re-tendered. 310 (9.0%) projects had zero expenditure, 1,139 (33.2%) had between 1% and 50% of expenditure, 1,071 (31.2%) had between 51% and 100% expenditure, 45 (1.3%) had expenditure over 100% of the estimate. The expenditure status for 863 (25.2%) was however not indicated.
- (vii) Out of the 3,428 projects undertaken during the 2023/24 FY, 524 (15.3%) projects were completed within the estimated cost. From the 214 (42.1%) institutions that undertook 3,428 development projects, 1,989 (58.0%) had their feasibility studies undertaken, feasibility study was not undertaken for 420 (12.3%) projects while the feasibility status for 1,019 (29.7%) projects was not indicated. Environmental Impact Assessment was undertaken for 2,147 (62.6%) projects, EIA was not undertaken for 533 (15.5%) projects, while the EIA status for 748 (21.8%) projects was not indicated.
- (viii) 257 (77.9%) institutions (excluding TVETIs) received recurrent and development funds from the Exchequer. Expenditure on recurrent budget amounted to KSh. 1,425.193 B.
- (ix) 44 (13.3%) institutions did not comply with the 70:30 Recurrent to Development ratio. The overall ratio of Personnel Expenditure (PE) to Operation and Maintenance (O&M) for the five service sectors was 33:67 and 168 (50.9%) institutions did not comply with the 35:65 expenditure ratio on PE to O&M.
- (x) 43 (16.7%) institutions achieved 100% budget absorption, 105 (40.9%) had absorption rate between 70-99%, 34 (13.2%) had absorption rate of between 50-69%, 37 (14.4%) had absorption rate of less than 50%, and 33 (12.8%) had absorption rate above 100%.
- (xi) Ministries and State Departments received the largest share of the budget with KSh. 1,954,291 with substantial allocation towards the development of a 69:31 ratio and 84% absorption rate. The overall budget absorption rate was 85%.
- (xii) 360 (70.9%) institutions implemented the "Buy Kenya-Build Kenya" (BKBK) policy initiative. A total of 192 (53.3%) institutions complied with the 40% procurement budget allocation for the BKBK with 30 (15.6%) Public Universities attaining 45% and 162 (84.3%) State Corporations attaining 41% compliance requirement.
- (xiii) The total procurement budget across all the 360 institutions was KSh. 727.6 B, with KSh. 234.8 B (32%) allocated to local goods and services. Therefore, the overall compliance with the 40% procurement threshold for local goods and services was 32%.
- (xiv) The 34 TVET institutes reported receiving KSh. 17,496,660 from the National Government Constituency Development Fund (NG-CDF), KSh. 203,748,956 from the capitation allocation, KSh. 298,837,744 from grants, KSh. 473,634,910.50 from development partners and KSh. 961,012,979 from fees paid by students. None of the TVET institutions reported receiving any funding from County Governments.
- (xv) The leading source of funding for development projects by TVETs was fees paid by students at 49%, followed by development partners at 24%. Others were National Government Grants at 15%, capitation at 11% and Constituency Development Fund (CDF) at 1%.
- (xvi) 188,785 students drawn from 141 (68.4%) TVET institutes received a capitation amounting to KSh. 2,243,004,131.9. The capitation amount per student was KSh. 11,881. The amount of capitation disbursed to 15,835 (8.4%) students was however not indicated.
- (xvii) 50,509 TVET students were awarded scholarships amounting to KSh. 1,356,917,953.4. The scholarship beneficiaries were drawn from 128 (62.1%) TVETs.
- (xviii) 431 institutions indicated that they had an approved list of pre-qualified suppliers. 232 (45.7%) institutions registered 146,022 pre-qualified suppliers on the PPIP while 392 (77.2%) institutions had migrated to PPIP.
- (xix) 363 (71.5%) of the 508 evaluated institutions advertised 28,722 tenders. 354 (69.7%) institutions that migrated to Public Procurement Information Portal (PPIP), advertised 36,774 tenders through the portal.
- (xx) 74 (18.9%) institutions disposed of 3,396 assets, while 149 (38%) institutions terminated 1,277 tenders through the Portal.
- (xxi) 367 (72.2%) institutions submitted reports to PPRA and therefore complied with the circular while 141 (27.8%) institutions did not.
- (xxii) 122 (24%) public institutions procured goods and services valued above KSh. 500,000 using 501,375 direct procurements.
- (xxiii) 1,056 tenders were terminated while 35,951 contracts were awarded. The Kenya Airports Authority (KAA) had the highest number of tenders terminated with 69 (6.5%) followed by Geothermal Development Company and Tharaka TVC with 55 (5.2%) and 50 (4.7%) respectively.
- (xxiv) The highest number of contracts were awarded by the National Transport and Safety Authority (NTSA) with 1029 (2.9%) while LAPFUND made the highest number of direct procurements with 500,000 (99.7%) of the total.
- (xxv) A total of 3,068 assets worth KSh. 5,035,057.14 were disposed to employees. Kenyatta University had the highest number of assets disposed to employees with 2,160 (70.4%) followed by Geothermal Development Company and Pyrethrum Processing Company with 314 (10.2%) and 219 (7.1%) respectively.
- (xxvi) 38 (7.5%) institutions had 60 appeals lodged against their procurement decisions out of which 56 (93.3%) were determined while three (5%) were ongoing. Regarding appeal decisions, 38 awards were upheld, 13 were quashed while the appeal decision for 9 institutions was not provided.
- (xxvii) The total value of procurement appeals was KSh. 18,818.05M. The Kenya Medical Supplies Authority (KEMSA) had the highest value of procurement appeals at 26.6% of the total followed by Kenya Ports Authority (KPA) at 16.5%, Kenya Electricity Generating Company PLC (KeGen) at 10.5% and National Water Harvesting and Storage Authority with 10.4%.
- (xxviii) 52 (10.2%) institutions had customized the Policy on Asset and Liability Management in the public sector (2020). 109 (21.5%) institutions had undertaken asset valuation and prepared valuation roll as recommended in the 2022/2023 Values and Principles Report, 239 (47.1%) institutions had established the Assets and Liabilities Standing Committees while 36 (7.1%) institutions had developed annual assets and liabilities plans.
- (xxix) 36 (7.1%) institutions had received 285 recommendations from PAC. 174 (61.1%) recommendations were fully implemented, 78 (27.4%) were partially implemented and 8 (2.8%) were not implemented. 8 PAC recommendations to 2 TVET institutes were all fully implemented.
- (xxx) 420 PIC recommendations were made to 54 (10.6%) institutions out of which 245 (58.3%) were fully implemented, 90 (21.4%) were partially implemented while 34 (8.1%) were not implemented.
- (xxxi) 211 (42%) institutions reported to have been audited by the Office of the Auditor General out of which 124 (59%) had a qualified opinion, 11 (5%) had an adverse opinion, 1 had a disclaimer opinion, and 75 (36%) had an unqualified opinion.

(xxxii) Only 7 (4%) TVET institutions reported to have been audited by Auditor General. 196 (96%) TVETs and 35 (69%) Ministries and State Departments were not audited in 2022/2023 FY.

(xxxiii) 373 (73.4%) institutions implemented programmes geared to support the realization of BETA. A total of 1,971 programmes related to the six BETA pillars were implemented at a cost of KSh. 1,783 B.

3.0 KEY RECOMMENDATIONS

3.1 General Recommendations

- (i) The organizations that did not submit Phase II data for the 2023/24 Values and Principles compliance evaluation survey to give reasons for the failure to submit the data for consideration in the evaluation.
- (ii) All bursaries awarded by the government should be consolidated for ease of administration and monitoring.

- (v) Review and harmonize the corruption prevention laws.
- (vi) Review and oversee the implementation of the Equalization Fund.
- (vii) All bursaries awarded by the government be consolidated for ease of administration and monitoring.
- (viii) Promote compliance with Article 250 (4) of the constitution on composition and appointments of Constitutional Commissions, Independent Offices and other State Offices to ensure representation of diverse communities of Kenya.
- (ix) Oversight implementation of affirmative action programmes by public institutions on representativeness of the public service.
- (x) Consider conducting an audit on the status of implementation of PIC and PAC recommendations by public institutions.

3.3 Recommendations to the Presidency

- (i) The government to organize a national values conference to deliberate and prescribe a way forward to promote and observe values and principles by all state organs and persons.
- (ii) The national honours and awards committee to introduce awards in the category of exemplars of integrity, upholding of national and public service values and principles, and promotion of national unity and patriotism.
- (iii) All bursaries awarded by the government be consolidated for ease of administration and monitoring.
- (iv) Government to enhance budgetary support for staff capacity development to 2 percent of the recurrent budget as per the HRD policy.
- (v) All public institutions to ensure that they have fully constituted and functional boards.

(vi) All public institutions to sign Performance Contracts by 30th August and cascade to all officers by 15th September as provided for under the Performance Management Regulations, 2021.

(vii) All public institutions that failed to implement PAC recommendations to explain the failure to implement the recommendations.

(viii) All public institutions which failed to implement PAC recommendations to implement the recommendations.

(ix) The institutions that failed to implement PIC recommendations to explain the failure to implement the recommendations.

(x) All public institutions that failed to implement PIC recommendations to implement the recommendations.

(xi) Oversee the implementation of affirmative action programmes 2024/2025, 20205/26 and 2026/2027 as committed by public institutions in order to promote equity, inclusivity and a public service representative of Kenya's diverse communities.

(xii) To enforce compliance with the court ruling which outlawed casual employment in the public service. (Petition No. 2 of 2013 Peter Wambugu Kariuki and 16 others Vs Kenya Agricultural Research Institute).

(xiii) The government to institutionalize business process documentation, automation of services and migration of the services to E-Platforms.

(xiv) Government to allocate funds to the Equalization Fund and fast-track implementation of projects under the fund.

3.4 Recommendations by Thematic Areas

3.4.1 On general human resource matters, it was recommended that:

- (i) All public institutions to comply with the statutory requirement to undertake workload analysis before approval of organizational structure and authorized establishment
- (ii) The terms of service for officers serving on permanent terms without pension be translated to permanent and pensionable terms
- (iii) The Public Service Commission to provide a policy position on what constitutes temporary appointment and issue policy guidelines on continued engagement of temporary staff.
- (iv) Public institutions with officers serving beyond the mandatory retirement age to comply with the statutory retirement age in the service.
- (v) All public institutions to pay staff through the payroll system.
- (vi) Public institutions to pay their officers on time to promote efficiency and effectiveness in service delivery and enhance staff motivation.
- (vii) The Public Service Commission to guide the public service on eligibility for secondment of public officers which is consistent with the stated purpose of secondment contained in the definition

3.4.2 Regarding service delivery improvement, it was recommended that:

- (i) All public institutions which had not developed citizen service delivery charters to develop the charters.
- (ii) Public institutions that had not customised their service delivery facilities for use by PWDs to customize them.
- (iii) All public institutions that had not undertaken baseline surveys to determine their levels of digitalization to do so.
- (iv) All public institutions to document, automate and migrate their business processes to e-platforms.

- (v) All public institutions that had not developed the social media engagement guidelines to do so.
- (vi) All public institutions which did not have customer service register to introduce the register.
- (vii) All public institutions to offer their services through Huduma centres to the extent practicable.
- (viii) All public institutions to establish lactation stations in compliance with Section 71 of the Health Act, 2017.

3.4.3 Regarding high standards of professional ethics in the public service, it was recommended that:

- (i) All public institutions to ensure that all eligible professionals serving in the institutions are registered with their professional bodies and maintain current practice status
- (ii) All public institutions to undertake sensitization for staff on the Public Service Code of Conduct and Ethics 2016 by 30th June 2025
- (iii) All public institutions to commit their staff to the public service conduct and ethics
- (iv) All public institutions to complete authentication exercises of certificates of all their staff
- (v) All public institutions to institutionalize authentication of certificates of officers before issuance of appointment letters at entry level and those being considered for promotional appointments.

3.4.4 Regarding good governance, transparency and accountability, it was recommended that:

- (i) Public institutions with officers who had acted beyond the prescribed 12 months to explain the circumstances under which the officers exceeded the statutory timelines.
- (ii) Public institutions to maintain records of approvals of officers performing higher duties including reasons for the appointments.
- (iii) All public institutions to ensure that they have fully constituted and functional boards.
- (iv) All TVET institutions to establish capitation and scholarship committees
- (v) All public institutions to establish effective mechanisms for reporting corruption cases.
- (vi) Investigating and prosecution agencies to expedite investigations and prosecution of reported cases of corruption.
- (vii) Public officers who make decisions that lead to civil litigations be held personally liable for any awards that may accrue against the institutions where the decision was made.
- (viii) All public institutions to implement strategies of management of conflict of interest as prescribed in the Leadership and Integrity Act, the Public Officer Ethics Act, Regulations and Public Service Code of Conduct and Ethics 2016 by 30th June 2025.
- (ix) All public institutions to prepare annual reports on the discharge of their mandates in order to promote transparency and accountability in service delivery.
- (x) Public institutions to administer initial declarations as part of the entry requirements for officers joining service within 30 days of joining service. Further, public institutions to administer final declarations as part of the exit requirements for officers exiting service within 30 days of exiting service.
- (xi) The Office of the Attorney General to explain the failure to comply with the recommendations in the 2022/2023 Values and Principles Report which includes an audit on the implementation of treaties and conventions ratified by Kenya and sensitization of public institutions on their roles in the implementation of the treaties and conventions.

3.4.5 Regarding performance management, it was recommended that:

- (i) All public institutions which had not developed or reviewed and aligned their strategic plans to the BETA Agenda to do so.
- (ii) All public institutions to sign performance contracts by 30th August of every financial year.
- (iii) All Public institutions which failed to comply with the requirement of setting of targets and performance appraisals to comply with Regulation 24 and 39 of the Public Service Commission (Performance Management) Regulations, 2021 on setting of performance targets and performance appraisals.
- (iv) All public institutions to establish functional Employee Performance Management Committees.
- (v) All public institutions to appraise all officers who set performance targets.
- (vi) All public institutions to implement the Rewards and Sanctions Policy against the appraised officers
- (vii) All public institutions to develop human resource management and development plans.
- (viii) All public institutions to regularly undertake skills and competency audits for purposes of upskilling to address emerging changes and challenges in the work environment.
- (ix) All public institutions to implement employee wellness programmes.
- (x) All public institutions to comply with the requirement to induct all newly appointed officers within three months of appointment.
- (xi) All public institutions to comply with the Public Service Commission Human Resource Development Policy, 2016 on the procedure of undertaking TNA.
- (xii) Public institutions to ensure that all public officers benefit from group trainings in order to comply with the policy requirement which requires all officers to attend 5-day training in a financial year.
- (xiii) The public service commission to review the Public Service Commission Human Resource Development Policy, 2016 to provide for a comprehensive framework for undertaking TIA.
- (xiv) All public institutions to implement the policy on full utilization of leave by public officers.
- (xv) All public institutions to ensure that leave taken is authorized and officers on leave comply with the timelines approved for leave.
- (xvi) Public institutions to maintain updated database of disciplinary cases in conformity with the discipline procedures.
- (xvii) All public institutions to utilize opportunities presented through exit to redress gender, ethnic and disability representation in the service.
- (xviii) All public institutions to institutionalize conducting of exit interviews.
- (xix) Public institutions which delayed timely submission of pension files to explain the delay.

3.4.6 Regarding equitable allocation of opportunities and resources, it was recommended that:

- (i) All public institutions which have attained the two-thirds gender principle to work towards attainment of gender parity at 50:50 to fulfil the Convention Against Elimination of All forms of Discrimination against Women (CEDAW) convention which is a state obligation under article 2(6) and 132 (2) (c) (iii).

- (iii) All public institutions to develop Affirmative Action Programmes to redress ethnic, gender and PWDs representation gaps in their institutions.
- (iv) All public institutions with procurement budgets to set aside and comply with the 30% allocation requirement to special groups.
- (v) The Public Service Commission to oversight distribution of scholarships in the public service in accordance with its mandate in Article 234(1) (f) and Section 56 of the Public Service Commission Act 2017 to ensure parity of treatment and equity in award of training opportunities to public officers.
- (vi) The bursary funds should be consolidated for ease of administration and monitoring.
- (vii) The State Department for Higher Education to maintain a database of students awarded scholarships desegregated by gender, ethnicity and PWD status.
- (viii) The Higher Education Loans Board to develop a criterion for equitable disbursement of loans.
- (ix) The State Department for TVET to develop an affirmative action framework which promotes inclusivity in terms of gender, ethnicity and PWD status in the distribution of capitation to students.
- (x) The State Department for Social Protection to undertake awareness sensitization to citizens on the Social Protection programme.
- (xi) The State Department for Micro Small and Medium Enterprise Development (MSME) and UWEZO fund to conduct due diligence on the administration of the funds and establish circumstances under which individuals were funded outside the group system and take necessary action to recover any funds that could have been lost.
- (xii) The State Department for MSME to conduct impact evaluation survey on youth empowerment programmes since its inception in 2006.
- (xiii) The National Treasury and Equalization Fund Secretariat to provide information on the implementation of the equalization fund since inception, projects implemented, the counties where they were implemented and the cost of each project.
- 3.4.7 Regarding public participation in policy-making process, it was recommended that:*

- (v) All public institutions to comply with the Buy Kenya built Kenya policy.

- (vi) The State Department for Technical and Vocational Education Training to maintain an updated database of TVET capitation disbursements.
- (vii) All public institutions to submit quarterly reports to PPRA
- (viii) All public institutions which had not customized the policy on Assets and Liability Management in the public sector to customize the policy.
- (ix) All public institutions which failed to implement PAC and PAC recommendations to implement the recommendations

3.4.9 Regarding devolution and decentralization of public services, it was recommended that:

- (i) The Public Service Commission to process and determine all county appeals within the six months regulatory timeline.
